Why We Collect

One of the more difficult to find in the Morgan Dollar, Silver Dollar series is the 1899. I came across one recently which causes this article. With a mintage of only 330,000, it is the 6th lowest mintage of all the Morgan Dollars. I have noticed over the years that you rarely see one at the coin shows or the shops. I have seen quit a few 1899-O Morgan Dollars that had mintage of over 12 million, that have been altered by the removal of the mint mark, and presented to be 1899 plain. So be careful if you are looking for one.

It appears to me that the 1899 Morgan Dollar is under valued. Current values show you might expect to pay about \$100 for a Very Good and about \$480 for a MS-63.

However, when you compare the value with the 1878CC, 1879CC, 1889CC, 1895O&S, 1896S, 1903O&S that all have significantly higher mintage's and values to name a few. I wonder why the 1899 is not much higher.

If you collect Morgan Dollars and don't have a 1899, there is a reason. I believe you would be wise to find one as soon as can and snap it up before the prices jump. Happy Hunting!

Open: President Harrell opened up the meeting at 8AM and led the group in the Pledge Of Allegiance. All those present are ONA members in good standing with the Association.

1) Election Results: Ballots were sent out in the April issue of The Mint Luster. In addition to the three regular offices up for elec-

tion (President, Vice President, and Secretary/Treasurer). 6 additional offices were voted on (reps from the 4 corners of the State and reps for Tulsa and OKC). While there was no formal competition, there were some write-in votes. Also, some folks did not complete a full ballot, leading to the numbers not evening out. 42 paper ballots were received with the following results:

2) Gary Parsons has volunteered to continue helping with the preparation of the Mint Luster. Brian Miller will continue as editor and Tim O'Keefe will continue to provide the mailing labels. It was suggested that someone from the Oklahoma City Club shadow Gary to be his back up in case there is an unanticipated issue.

3) Secretary/Treasurer Tim O'Keefe did some checking and found out that the ONA has not filed a tax return since 2006. Further investigation showed that since no returns had been filed for a 3 year period after 2006, the Association's 501.3c status was revoked in 2010. There was no indication of this in Shane Cornell's records when he passed in 2021. O'Keefe has a tax firm in Tulsa checking on a resolution. Since the Association has not taken in any donations over \$600 in recent years, there should not be any associated penalties. The tax firm is checking and they believe that the IRS will probably be satisfied with filing the past 5 years of returns. There will be a filing fee involved. We have bank statements going back to 2013 and a checkbook with some missing data. Data from December 2020 when O'Keefe took over is fully documented. Gardners Tax Service is handling the account.

4) At the September 2022 Board Meeting it was agreed that the

Association needed new display cases. S/T O'Keefe purchased two new cases from Ohio for approximately \$500. Member Mike Boyer said he can obtain some re-pops for us at a reduced price.

5) At the September 2022 Board Meeting it was voted on that the 6 new area representatives would have full voting rights with Association business. Discussion was opened up over what number would be considered a quorum in order to conduct ONA business. There was a motion by Robert Gilmore to make that number 5, seconded by Ed McGill. The motion passed by acclamation.

6) At the September 2022 Board Meeting it was voted on that there would be an increase in dues for Association membership. Discussion was opened up as to what the dues would be. There was a motion by Dale Schaeffer to create a Youth category. Anyone under 18 years of age would be charged \$5 for a One- Year membership. Motion was seconded by Mike Boyer. Motion passed by acclamation. Discussion then began on adult memberships. President Harrell suggested we needed to be forward thinking so that we are not raising dues for several years. The consensus was that One-Year dues for both Adults and Clubs be \$20, and Lifetime Memberships be raised to \$175. The motion to accept was

made by Richard McPheeters and seconded by Mike Boyer. This motion passed by acclamation.

7) In order to attract more members, there was a motion by Richard McPheeters to have an ONA Membership Table at both State shows. The motion was seconded by Robert Gilmore. The motion passed by acclamation.

8) President Harrell wanted to thank the Oklahoma City Coin Club for their assistance with the coin show this weekend. Without their help the show would not have been as successful. The hope is that someone from the Oklahoma City metro area will be able to organize the 2024 show from this part of the state.

9) Open Discussion: Rich Wall, who was the bourse chairman for this show last year, asked if the ONA was going to return to El

Reno next year. President Harrell said it would depend on the final financial numbers from this year's show. We hope to know by early June.

Secretary/Treasurer O'Keefe thought it might be time to recognize some of our outstanding members. Richard McPheeters said the ONA used to have an Okie Award to do just that. There will be more discussion at the September 2023 Board meeting in Broken Arrow (8am, Saturday September 9, 2023, at Stoney Creek Hotel in Broken Arrow).

With no further business, the meeting was closed at 8:35AM.



What We Collect


As collectors we all have coins or notes that we want to add to our collections, but no matter how hard we try, we just cannot locate them, either because they are too pricey, they are too rare to be available, or they are just too difficult to find. I once spent a year trying to track down a very common 1982 Irish half penny. Ebay could not assist, junk boxes came up empty, and coin shows just did not have them. I finally found a curio shop on the internet in Paris, France, that had one. I paid up for the coin, and even more for international postage, but I completed my search.

Something I like to preach about is for people to get out to coin shows and visit with the dealers. They are a wealth of information. And as they travel show to show, they can increase your chances of finding something you desire in your particular area of interest. In early May 2023, I received an e-mail from Bill Litt. He is a Governor for the Society of Paper Money Collectors and runs William Litt Currency on the

internet. I met Bill at the International Paper Money Show in Kansas City in 2018. He knows that I concentrate on 1929 Series national bank notes, and specifically those from Connecticut and Oklahoma. I have purchased notes from his site frequently and we correspond several times during the year. This time he contacted me to say he had come across a Falls Village, CT note at the Central States Show in Chicago, and asked if I would be interested. The e-mail sat in my inbox for several hours before I could respond. I have a Type I \$20 from Falls Village, but not the Type I \$10 that he had located. I answered with a resounding yes. However, in the hours it took me to respond, he sent a follow up e-mail as he came across a better treasure. I have been searching for a note from nearby Sapulpa, Ok for some time. Bill surprised me by sending a picture of a Charter 7788 Type II \$10 from the American National Bank of Sapulpa. It has a small "V" torn in the upper right quadrant. On



top of that, it was PGCS certified at VF25 (net) despite the damage. But that was not the best part. The serial number was A000001. I have been trying to track down any Serial #1 note since I started collecting nationals in 2012. And now here was a coveted and certified Oklahoma note AND a Number 1. I could not close the deal fast enough. Bill knows that notes going to me are getting a proper home and not being sought after to flip or trade. He made me a very reasonable offer on both items and soon they were heading my way from his California home.

The next step was research. Sapulpa is located just a few short miles southwest of Tulsa along the famous Route 66. The town was founded in 1850 by Chief Sapulpa, who was a full-blood lower Creek from the Kasihta Tribe of Alabama. The town started out as a trading post

just outside the site of the present-day city.

I took an afternoon and went to Sapulpa to learn more. My good friend, Byron Davis, lives in Sapulpa and suggested I start at the Sapulpa Historical Museum located at 100 E Lee Street. There I met the curator, Rachel Whitney. I explained that I was looking for information on the American National Bank. She said that the museum did not really concentrate on numismatic items, but they did keep files on local institutions. She located a folder filled with all sorts of information on the bank and allowed me to access the contents.

The American National Bank of Sapulpa was chartered in Oklahoma Indian Territory on June 15, 1905, with its headquarters in the Garst Building at Main and Dewey. The bank opened for



which started a family succession. His son, Guy Berry Jr, took over as president in 1957, and his son, William Berry, assumed the mantle in 1980. The American National Bank eventually was taken over by American Heritage Bank, with branches in Yale, Berryhill,

business on July 15, 1905. In 1910, the bank moved into the nearby Berryhill Building, where it remained until September 13, 1930. It then moved into a new building just down the street. The Berryhill Building still stands today and has been repurposed to contain several shops and businesses.

Springs, Kellyville, Mannford, Beggs, Cleveland, and Mounds.

The first president of the bank was LB Jackson, who was a local oil man. The Tulsa area was in a boom through the 1920s with the discovery of oil in the Glenpool area to the south. Jackson remained president through 1939. His signature appears on my note.

Ms. Whitney was cordial enough to allow me to photograph some of the items in the folder. There were a few checks issued by the bank, a drawing of the new bank from 1930, and a letterhead from the bank dated 1925. There was also a picture of a model of the new bank. I took a tour of the museum once I finished my searching. There are several

In 1925, Guy Berry was an assistant cashier for the bank. In 1939 he became bank president





small scale models of the buildings and streets of Sapulpa throughout the museum along with plenty of memorabilia that fill the three floors of the structure. Its free to tour the museum, but they do take donations (and I did leave one).

Sapulpa had one other national bank. Preceding the American National Bank of Sapulpa was the First National Bank of Sapulpa (Charter 5951). This bank was short lived, being char-


tered August 28, 1901, but going into receivership on July 30, 1923. Notes from both banks are quite scarce The Don Kelly book (National Bank Notes 6th Edition- 2006) shows no Indian Territory notes from either bank. There are 9 known large size notes from Charter 7788, while only four from Charter 5951. The American National Bank issued Type I and II \$10s and \$20s but only 11 overall have been reported. I have the 12th. Towns and cities in Creek County Oklahoma



did not issue many notes, and even fewer have survived, so I feel fortunate to have acquired one.

I cannot emphasize enough the value of networking. I have dealers from around the country looking for notes for me. On the local horizon (Oklahoma-Texas-Kansas) I have people like Richard McPheeters, Ted Williams, Marvin Johnson, and Mike Burney searching for and obtaining items for me. There is camaraderie, communication, a sense of purpose, and financial remuneration (for them). I highly recommend getting to know your local coin dealer or wander the floor at your next coin show.

Most dealers like to talk about their inventories. You will meet some neat people and gain valuable information and insight. There is at least one dealer for almost every category of collecting. Utilize your "human resources" and get to know the folks in your field. And as always, find something you like and collect the heck out of it.

CODE OF ETHICS OF THE OKLAHOMA NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION

Membership in the Oklahoma Numismatic Association is a privilege extended to those persons and organizations deemed worthy thereof and is not a matter of right. Such membership can be maintained only until the Board of Directors determines that the conduct of a member has been such that, in the best interest of the Association, such membership should be terminated.

For the guidance of its members, this Code of Ethics has been duly adopted by the Board of Directors under the authority vested in it by the Oklahoma Numismatic Association Bylaws. A breach thereof by any member reflects, directly or indirectly, upon all members. Such a breach shall be considered conduct prejudicial to the welfare of the Association and cause for action by the Board of Directors.

As a Member of the Oklahoma Numismatic Association:

I agree not to sell, exhibit, produce nor advertise counterfeits, copies, restrikes and/or reproductions of any numismatic items if their nature is not clearly indicated by the word "counterfeit", "copy", "restrike", "reproduction" incused in the metal or printed on the paper thereof, with the exception of items generally accepted by numismatists and not in any way misrepresented as genuine;

I agree to represent a numismatic item to be genuine only when, to the best of my knowledge and belief, it is authentic;

I agree to fulfill all contracts made by me, either orally or written, to make prompt payments upon delivery, and to return immediately any item that is not satisfactory;

I agree to give aid to members in their quest for numismatic knowledge.
