The September 2020 meeting of the MECC was opened at 6:05pm as President Harrell welcomed 10 members and two guests.

August Minutes: S/Treasurer Tim O'Keefe sent out a copy of the August minutes electronically to those members having e-mail. Hard copies were available at the start of tonight's meeting. There was a motion by John Sayco to accept the minutes as presented, seconded by Mark Kephart.

Telephone Report: Sheryl and Keith Morgan were unable to attend tonight's meeting due to a personal matter. Tim O'Keefe was advised that Sheryl made the monthly calls and had contact with 11 members.

Membership: 1) Long time member, former President, and club accountant John Sands is getting married and leaving the state. We thank him for his service and wish him well on the next chapter of his life. 2) Guest AJ Voynar and his wife have joined the club.

Drawings: Won by Todd Hourihan and John Sayco.

Old Business: 1) At the suggestion of American Numismatic Association President Col. Steve Ellsworth, the ANA website has been updated with the Club's information. If you type in "Tulsa coin club", Magic Empire comes up. 2) Oklahoma Numismatic Association President Gary Parsons was recognized in The Numismatist for his outstanding work in promoting coin collecting in Oklahoma. 3) Member James Eklof won the Youth Exhibitors competition at the Tulsa Coin Show for his display on Buffalo nickels

New Business: 1) The Club will decide at the October meeting where to hold this year's holiday dinner. Be thinking of a venue that can accommodate at least 20 of us. 2) Gary Parson's coin show will be in McAlester October 16 & 17 at their fairgrounds off the Indian Nations Turnpike.

Show & Tell: Ron Lawrence presented British bank tokens. Dale Schaffer had a 1919-D Walking Liberty Half counterfeit and explained how to determine it was fake. James Eklof had a set of Indian and Wheat cents.

Educational Presentation: Tim O'Keefe gave a talk on coins, currency, and tokens of the US Civil War, explaining the economic turmoil of the country through the 1850s and showing examples of Flying Eagle cents, Indian cents, silver trimes, copper 3 cent pieces, bronze two cent pieces, half dimes, Shield nickels, fractional currency, and some Civil War tokens (provided by Ron Lawrence).

Open Discussion: Per the previous meeting, we discussed adjusting the auction procedures. Index cards will be available on a separate table in the meeting room. Items offered will be placed on the same table, and should be described, have an opening bid or reserve listed, and the name of the seller on the card. Once the bidding on that item is done, the card and item are then brought to the treasurer for payment.

Committee: President Harrell would like to propose creating a sub-committee to schedule and locate speakers for the bi-monthly Educational Presentations. More to be discussed in October. The October 2020 meeting of Tulsa's Magic Empire Coin Club was opened at 6:06 pm as President Harrell welcomed 11 members and 4 guests to the proceedings.

Old Business: 1) The Coin TV productions filmed at the Coin Show are now available for viewing on Youtube. David Lisot did 20 minute interviews covering the overall show and one of Gary Parson's lectures on Barber dimes. There are two shorter presentations featuring Col. Ellsworth and President Harrell. Go to Youtube, type in 'Cointv', then search for Greater Tulsa Coin Show. 2) The Facebook page is growing by the week. Our post featuring James Eklof and his Youth Numismatic win at the Tulsa Coin show already has 242 hits. 3) The McAlester Coin Show was a week ago. Though attendance was down, sales were up, continuing a trend we have noticed all year. Several club members either had tables or attended. 4) President Harrell opened up the floor to discussion on fees from the auction. We determined that starting with the 2021 auctions, there will be a 5% buyer fee and 5% seller fee for each item on the block. At the end of the year, the money will be designated to a charity chosen by the Club at that time. (Motion by Vice President Todd Hourihan, seconded by AJ Voynar). The cash will go into the club checking account, and S/T O'Keefe will be responsible for keeping tabs on the total rather than opening a separate account. President

Harrell has created a form to keep track of each transaction during the bidding process.

Show & Tell: Guest Sean Berry showed off parts of his collection, including a 1922 Peace Dollar, and 1879 Morgan Dollar, an 1838 Large Cent, and a 1942 Walking Liberty Half Dollar. Ron Lawrence presented a 1932-A five mark piece from Germany that is a very well-done fake. Tim O'Keefe showed some Series 1929 national bank notes from Louisiana, including specimens from The Hibernia National Bank of New Orleans (Charter 13688), The First National Bank of Shreveport (Charter 3595), and The Louisiana National Bank of Baton Rouge (Charter 9834). In addition, had had \$5, \$10, and \$20 Type I notes from The Whitney National Bank of New Orleans (Charter 3069) which feature the president's signature of James D O'Keefe.

Guest Audrey M Reis-Woodcock brought a varied collection of US and world coins, mostly from the World War II era. Club members helped her identify and price several of the items.

Auction: Vice President Hourihan acted as auctioneer as several items went up for bid. A total of five items exchanged hands.

Close: The membership was

reminded to attend the Black Friday Coin Show to be held in Glenpool the weekend of Thanksgiving. The membership was also asked to consider topics and speakers for future educational presentations.

There was a motion by AJ Voynar to close the meeting, seconded by John Sayco. The meeting adjourned at 7:06PM.

The November 2020 meeting of the MECC was opened at 6:05pm by Vice President Todd Hourihan. President Chris Harrell was unable to attend due to personal business. VP Hourihan welcomed the 13 members and two guests in attendance.

# Lowly Beginnings II

I'm sitting here behind my cluttered desk in my tiny coin shop (suitable for a semi-retired coin dealer) I find myself still active putting coins in 2x2's awaiting the next phone call or occasional walk up customer. I open a partial roll of 1943-D steel cents that have been resting for who knows how many years and see that they still maintain luster. Let's say they range from MS 63 – 65 somewhat attractive, the kind that would fit in a nice uncirculated set. Put away for over 75 years it still amazes me how nice they look.

As I begin my task of stapling up these pieces, I examine them and wonder how many people know why they were struck in steel and not copper, duh! Of course you say the war effort – copper was used to make bullets and to win WWII it was taking a lot of it but did you know how these steel coated cents had an Oklahoma connection? That's where my real story begins.

Back in the mid-fifties my older brother Don enrolled in North Eastern A&M college at Miami. This was some 70 miles from our small farm near Bushyhead. The

old brown '53 Pontiac with mom driving and sister and brother joining these trips were somewhat interesting up old Route 66. The sights along the way have not changed much except now it's turnpike 75 mph. Back in the day if you made it to Miami in 2 hours you were doing good. One night I do remember in particular as we approached Miami, were the gray hills off in a distance – What in the world!?! Huge mounds of chat dug out of the ground and piled hundreds of feet high. The closer you get the uglier they became. These chat mounds dotted the landscape even up to Kansas and around Picher, Commerce, and Quapaw, Oklahoma.

I learned then and still remember they were tailings from the lead and zinc mines that lay underground of Northeastern Oklahoma and South east Kansas and parts of Missouri. It's been estimated that 10,000 miles of underground caverns (man-made) with 14,000 mine shafts run throughout this area. In addition to the story, this area, (thanks to Tar Creek and water run-off) by the 1980's the E.P.A. declared it the nation's number one biohaz-

ard and Superfund site. But in their hay-day lead and zinc mines produced much of the nation's necessary metal for both WWI and WWII. And that is where the coating for the 1943 steel cents came from.

Like many of our Oklahoma towns that flourished and died, Commerce, Quapaw, Picher and

others had their time in history. Even the chat mounds have gradually disappeared. While most of our 1943 steel cents have tarnished and rusted just remember when you handle one that Oklahoma had its part in this passing history.



# What We Collect

**G**enerally when I am doing research I like to be as 'hands on' as possible, as it greatly enhances my learning experience. However, with the virus still very active among us, I was forced to take a different approach to this quarter's column. About 4 years ago I was able to obtain a Type II 1929 national bank note from The First National Bank of Nowata, Charter 5401. I have been through the city a few times on the way to Kansas on Highway

169 and had planned to make a day trip up there to investigate the bank further. But while doing some due diligence for planning that trip, I used the internet to scope the area out. I discovered that the Nowata City County Library is temporarily closed due to the pandemic. Likewise, the Nowata County Historical Museum is also shut down because of the virus. The on-line search engine for the Nowata





Star newspaper only goes back to 1943. I also figured that walking around a strange town wearing a mask and asking about a bank would bring unwanted scrutiny towards me. Undeterred, I went with Plan B, which entailed some old-fashioned book reading and computer research.

According to "National Bank Notes (6th Edition)" by Don Kelly, Nowata had four national banks. The FNB of Nowata was chartered in Indian Territory on June 5, 1900. The bank was not a prolific issuer of notes, and his census shows only 14 large size notes and 21 small size notes reported. This was the most successful of the banks. The Nowata National Bank, Charter 6367, was chartered on August 5, 1902, but went into receivership in

February 1924. The other two banks coincidentally were chartered at the same time. The Producers National Bank of Nowata, Charter 9948, and The Commercial National Bank of Nowata, Charter 9949, both came into existence after Oklahoma earned statehood (1907) in March 1911. The Producers Bank was short-lived, as it was liquidated in January 1914. The Commercial Bank survived to November 1930 and actually produced Type I small sized notes in denominations of \$10s and \$20s. Only three of those have been reported to the census.

The Oklahoma Historical Society website indicates that "Nowata" is from the Delaware word for "welcome". There is also an urban legend that the name came



from a grammatically-challenged sign at a dried-up spring that read “no wata”. The city was incorporated on April 17, 1899. The FNB of Nowata shared its original building with the Federal Courthouse. In 1909, that building was destroyed by fire. I was able to track down a post-card showing the aftermath of that fire. A new building was erected in 1911. It stands today as The Regent Bank of Nowata.

The note that I have was purchased for a very surprising and reasonable price on ebay. It is one of three listed in the national census. The Andrew Pollack signature census shows very few bank officers for the institution from its creation though the end of the national bank period in 1935. The bank presidents were John E Campbell (1900-1925), EB Lawson (1926-1929), and HL Campbell (1930-1935). The cashiers were HC Campbell (1900-1904), PS Powell (1904-

1918), JD Powell (1919-1927), and AS Gentry (1927-1935). The note I have has the HC Campbell-AS Gentry signature combination. The bank issued 874 Type II \$10s and only 324 Type II \$20s. At the 2020 Tulsa Coin Show I was able to obtain a Type I \$10 from Texas dealer Ted Williams. It has the EB Lawson-AS Gentry signature combination. The serial number of D000024A is the lowest of the eleven reported on the census.

So while I saved a bit on gas money, I was disappointed not to venture north to Nowata County. Oklahoma had 557 chartered banks covering 258 cities from 1890 to 1935. Of that, 214 operated during the small-sized era of 1929-1935. Still, Oklahoma notes are at a premium and difficult to track down in decent shape. As always, find something you like and collect the heck out of it.

My school isn't out until the
