The May 2017 meeting of the Magic Empire Coin Club was opened up at 7:02 PM by President John Sands, who welcomed the twelve members and two guests in attendance.

Old Business: Vice President Chris Harrell, along with members Dale Schaeffer, Richard McPheeters, and Shane Cornell, all had tables at the Oklahoma City Show in early May. Members Keith and Sheryl Morgan helped Dale out with his wares. The show had more dealers than ever, and was moved to different building on the fairgrounds there. The Tulsa Show is still on track for September. Most of the tables have sold out, and Dale has again enlisted the membership of the Club to assist.

New Business: ANA has recognized Magic Empire to be a club in good standing. As such, we have been given 10 free ANA memberships that we may use as we see fit. These memberships cannot be used by current members or someone who has been a member in the past calendar year. 3 of these were distributed at tonight's meeting. They are

good up to October 31, 2017. Mint Luster dues will be collected with the June newsletter. Also, it's time for the election of State officers. There will be a mailer inside the June newsletter.

Show & Tell: President Sands brought a gold Roman coin circa 44-42 b.c. and Shane Cornell showed a 1580 Transylvanian thaler. Secretary / Treasurer Tim O'Keefe brought a series of coins and bill from the South Pacific, including Australia, Niue, Tuvalu, British New Guinea, and the Keeling Cocos Islands.

Auction: Keith Morgan took on the role of auctioneer as approximately 20 different lots of coins and numismatic-related items switched hands. The auction took up the majority of the meeting.

Close: Dale Schaeffer has volunteered to take the June Educational Program.

The June 2017 meeting of the MECC was opened up at 7PM by Drawing's were won by S/T O'Keefe and John Sayko.

Old Business: The Tulsa Coin

Show prep work is still on track. The Club is considering holding a raffle on Saturday and Sunday of the show.

New Business: There was discussion about having the Club partner with Robert Ranford in participating in the Glenpool Black Friday Coin Show in November.

ANA elections are underway. The ANA sent the Club a ballot, which was presented to the Club membership. Two of the candidates are from Oklahoma. S/T O'Keefe will forward the completed ballot.

Open Discussion : Dale Schaeffer and Ron Lawrence talked about the Clubs extensive history in the Tulsa area, explaining about different venues for past shows and the participation of past Club officers.

Educational Presentation: Dale Schaeffer gave his talk on Canadian token coinage of the 1800s. He brought samples from Upper and Lower Canada, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, and Nova Scotia. He discussed the French and British influences on coinage, along with history of the area. He also brought several samples of tokens and related books, all of which are available to the Club.

Show & Tell: Ron Lawrence brought a 12 shilling piece of Charles I from Scotland, a 1712 half crown of Queen Ann from Great Britain, and an 1817 half crown of George III from Great Britain. S/T O'Keefe presented a series of coins from the Turks and Caicos Islands and from the British Virgin Islands.

Close: The July 2017 meeting will feature an auction. It will be held on July 27.

The July 2017 meeting of the MECC was opened up at 7PM by Vice President Chris Harrell, filling in for President John Sands. He welcomed the 7 members and 2 new members in attendance. The June 2017 minutes were read by Secretary Tim O'Keefe, and they were approved after a motion by Charles Meyers and a second from Keith Morgan. Jearldine Lawrence gave the Telephone Report and said she had contacted everyone. Drawings were won by Ron Lawrence and Sheryl Morgan.

Chris Harrell and Tim O'Keefe both attended the Northwest Arkansas Coin Show in Rogers, AR earlier in the month.

The club brought up moving to another location. There was a motion by Keith Morgan and a second by Sheryl Morgan to open up the floor to related discussion.

Chris Harrel brought up the possibility over changing the venue of the monthly meeting at the first of the year. He is going to check with a few local libraries about availability.

Old Business: Dale Schaffer gave out assignment's for the upcoming Tulsa Coin Show. Flyers have been made up and will be distributed by the membership. Set up at the show, working the door, and refreshments access were discussed. The club also plans to have door prizes provided by club members for the show. The registration cards at the door will be used to determine the winners. Winners need to be present to win.

He brought collections of Shield Nickels, Liberty Nickels, Buffalo Nickels, and Jefferson Nickels and gave background on each series.

Show & Tell: Ron Lawrence brought a 1964 English Maundy set, an Iceland mint set, two coins from the Order of Malta, a Continental Dollar, and an old silver match carrier. Louise Sands brought two coins of the Byzantine Empire 400-560 AD. John Sands showed a complete collection of Flying Eagle and Indian Head cents. Todd Hanrahan presented a slabbed 1938 Indian Head/Buffalo nickel.

Close: The Tulsa Coin Show is set for September 8-10. The next meeting of the MECC is set for 7PM on Thursday September 28, 2017. There was a motion by Sherry Perdue which was seconded by Dale Schaffer to close the meeting. The meeting was closed at 7:48PM.

What We Collect

One of the mainstays of the Magic Empire Coin Club is that every other month we have an Educational Presentation. One of our members volunteer to do 20 minutes on any numismatical subject, and the Club rewards that member with a Morgan silver dollar (or a dinner, if the presenter is not with the Club). Since we have a diverse collecting body to choose from within our membership and we rarely repeat topics, which keeps our subjects fun and interesting.

This past April it was my turn at the podium. It is always good to talk about something you know, so I chose 1929 Series National Bank Notes of Connecticut. Even though I have made Oklahoma my home State since 1982, I was born and bred in the Constitution State, having attended grade school and high school there. As I have mentioned in this column before, my Grandfather, Frank Kremer, worked in the yards of the New Haven Railroad until his retirement in 1967. My mom co-authored a book on the history of Norwich, Connecticut, and con-

tinues to give lectures on the subject. My parents still reside in Western Connecticut, and I try to make it back there at least once a year.

National bank notes were issued from 1863 to 1935, and there were over 14,500 charters established. Connecticut, being a small state, had only 117 issuing charters. By the late 1920s, that number was down to 57, making notes from that part of the country somewhat scarce. Type I notes (1929-1933) have the charter number in two places on the obverse, and the serial number always ends with the letter "A". Type II notes (1933-1935) have the charter number in four places on the obverse, with a shortened serial number that always ends with a numeric, and they are much scarcer.

All national bank notes ceased to be issued in the Spring of 1935 when President Franklin Roosevelt called for an immediate bank holiday and reorganized the country into 12 Federal Reserve districts. There are about a dozen easily obtainable

Connecticut bank charters out there, some difficult ones, and few that are darn near impossible. My Educational Presentation afforded me the opportunity to show off some of my collection.

The first chartered bank in Connecticut was the First National Bank of New Haven, which had Charter #2. It was organized in 1863, but was liquidated in 1882. Banks chartered in 1863 had their charters extended only to May 1882. Legislation extending charter life was not passed until July 1882. So Charter 2682, a New Haven Bank that was chartered in 1882, grew out of Charter 2. The institution basically employed the same officers and operated out of the same location. In order to instill confidence in a local financial institution for the public, they requested to utilize the long defunct Charter 2 in March of 1909. This was a somewhat common practice, as about two dozen other banks around the nation did the same thing, exchanging a high charter number for a lower obsolete one. The new bank organized as the First National Bank And Trust Company of New Haven, so Charter #2 began its renewed life with a second title. I have Type I \$10 and \$20 examples. Other New Haven banks that issued Type I and Type II notes include The Merchants National Bank Of New Haven (Charter

1128), The National Tradesmens Bank Of New Haven (Charter 1202), and The New Haven National Bank (Charter 1243). I have bills from all three banks.

Charter #4 belongs to Stamford, Connecticut, and this bank survived from June 1863 all the way to 1935. I obtained my Type I \$10 at the Glenpool Coin Show from longtime Oklahoma dealer Eddie Sise in 2012. He was intrigued with the fact that with his vast inventory of nationals from the Midwest, I chose his only East Coast specimen. When I gave him the background on why I wanted Connecticut notes, he said he understood completely and said he would keep his eye out for more. It took me until this year to track down a comparable Type II \$10 to pair up with the first one.

I spent about 10 years living in Norwich, CT. Before I obtained my Don Kelly book, I had hoped to get 1929 Series notes from there. Alas, as I became more educated, I discovered that Charter 65, Charter 224, Charter 458, Charter 657, Charter 1187, Charter 1358, Charter 1379, and Charter 1481 were all closed for various reasons by 1928. If I ever begin a large note collection, that will be my starting point.

Hartford is the capital of Connecticut. There were 12 chart-

ed banks all together, but only three (#121, #1338, and # 13038) survived to issue the 1929 Series notes. I have examples from all three institutions. I have two Type I \$20s from Charter 1338. Approximately half way through the printing run, the bank changed Cashiers, so I have one with the signature of Roland J Utley, and another with his replacement, Ostrum Enders. The value of each remains the same.

Obtaining notes from places I've lived or attended school always piques my interest. I was born in Derby, Connecticut. One of my earliest purchases was from Valley Coins in Seymour, CT. Proprietor Ed Zehall is always a dependable resource. He sold me a Type I \$5 from the Birmingham National Bank of Derby (Charter 1098). The building still stands today. It is now a restaurant, and if you make reservations early enough, you can dine in the vault. I lived in Danielson, CT in the early 1960s. I have Type I and Type II notes of The Windham County National Bank of Danielson (Charter 1360). The bank building survives now as a resale shop on Main Street. I attended a year of grade school in Middletown, CT, and have specimens from Charters 1216 and 1340. I have several other notes of interest. New Britain's Charter 1184 issued only Type I

\$10s, so that was a fairly easy set to complete. Connecticut has only eight counties, and Tolland is the hardest one to get notes from. My lone example is a Type I \$20 from The Rockville National Bank (Charter 509) which I bought from Don Kelly. The National Bank Note Census is an on-line directory showing how many of a particular note has been reported. I have few notes whose known population is 10 or less, including a Type I \$10 from The Mystic River National Bank (Charter 645), a Type II \$10 from The First National Bank Of Litchfield (Charter 709), Type I and Type II \$10s from The Deep River National Bank (Charter 1139), a Type I \$10 from The First National Bank And Trust Company of New Canaan (Charter 1249), a Type I \$20 from The First National Bank Of Winsted (Charter 2414), and a Type I \$10 from The Peoples National Bank of Stamford (Charter 12400). One of my neatest notes was obtained from Denly's Of Boston. It is a Type I \$20 from The National Iron Bank of Falls Village (Charter 1214). I had never heard of the town until I saw it on their website, and it is one of only six reported.

And there are some notes I may not want. The National Bank Of Commerce Of New London holds the distinction of having Charter 666. I have enough trou-

ble dealing with Irish luck. One wonders why they did not skip that particular number.

The final chartered bank in Connecticut was The Tradesmens National Bank of New Haven (Charter 13704) which issued only Type II notes, as it was chartered in June 1933. I purchased a \$10 note at an East Haven Coin Show from Rhode Island dealer Paula Habib in 2015 for a very reasonable price.

The hardest notes to acquire are from short lived banks or those with small populations, including The First National Bank of Rockville (Charter 186), The Essex National Bank (Charter 8936), The Plantsville National Bank (Charter 12637), and The Byram National Bank of East Port Chester (Charter 12973). I've seen

examples of all, but they have lofty prices. One I have never seen is a note from The National Pahquioque Bank Of Danbury (Charter 1132). I also cannot pronounce that bank name.

I have enhanced the collection with vintage post cards from some of the banks, matchbook covers from the era advertising specific national banks, examples of canceled checks from a few of the institutions, cards from some places that used "bank by mail", and a few recent photographs of some of the buildings as they stand today. I enjoyed giving the presentation to Magic Empire, and it was good to share the fruits of my labor with an attentive and appreciative group. As always, find something you like and collect the heck out of it.
