ONA News

The summer of 2025 was quite eventful and the Oklahoma Numismatic Association was a large part of the action.

ONA Life Member Mike McClendon (LM-281) brought coin shows back to Muskogee. Utilizing Muskogee's Martin Luther King Community Center on August 8 and 9, the customers filled the venue and kept the dealers busy throughout the event. The 2026 Show is already in the planning stages with room to expand.

The American Numismatic Association brought the World's Fair of Money to Oklahoma City August 19-23. Tyler Tyson of the Oklahoma City Coin Club did a stellar job of gathering ONA volunteers to assist with the festivities. 500 dealers, classes, demonstrations, a Kids Zone, competitive exhibits, guests from all over the country- just a total success. And the ANA was impressed enough to say they want to return in the coming years.

The ONA will celebrate 50 year of existence in 2026. Thanks to the

vision and perseverance of Jake Sureck in the 1970s, we have continued to evolve and grow. We have had an ONA tablecloth created to showcase the organization at coin shows. We have discussed getting polo shirts with the ONA logo featured. We are asking for other ideas to commemorate the occasion, so reach out to the Association officers with your ideas.

The bi-annual ONA Board Meeting was held at Stoney Creek Hotel and Conference Center in Broken Arrow during the Fall 2025 ONA Coin Show. We had enough Association members for a quorum to proceed with business (President Raven Goyer, Vice President Bill Norfleet, Secretary/Treasurer Tim O'Keefe, and Regional Representatives Richard McPheeters and Todd Hourihan.). All taxes from 2007 to 2023 have been filed. There is a delay with the IRS (on their end) filing our 2024 return which we hope to have resolved by November. The Oklahoma City Coin Club was issued a check for their help at the Spring ONA Show in Moore. It was discussed

that we need to document the duties of the host clubs and ensure payment is given in a timely manner. Stoney Creek has increased their charges for using the facility and we may look for another venue for next year. Todd Hourihan brought up the idea of giving a per diem and/or paid hotel room for the Association President and Vice President to attend the ONA Show if it across the State. This issue was tabled until the Spring 2026 meeting. We also voted to suspend admission fees. The Moore Community Center would not allow us to charge admission in exchange for their advertising. We also discussed billboard advertising for future shows.

The Fall 2025 ONA Show was well attended. NewsOn6 KOTV did a Saturday piece on the pro-

ceedings. A few of the dealers sold out. We had several new dealers come in for the show. And thanks to Tulsa's Magic Empire Coin Club for keeping the weekend running smoothly.

Secretary/Treasurer O'Keefe still has a few ONA Lifetime pins available for any members who want one, Contact him by phone or e-mail. Annual dues of \$20 were due on July 1 for all non-Lifetime members. If you have not paid yet, please forward your renewal membership money to O'Keefe as soon as you can.

OPEN: President Greg Shoaf led the group in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at 6:05pm. He welcomed the 16 members in attendance.

Previous Minutes: Secretary Tim O'Keefe sent out the June 2025 minutes by email. There were no additions or corrections noted. There was a motion by Ron Trezell to accept the minutes as presented, seconded by President Shoaf. Motion passed.

Telephone Report: Mrs. Sayko had some problems with the call tree, as a number on the list cannot be removed and the recipient is less than understanding. Secretary O'Keefe is going to rebuild a new list and will send out the reminders in the future.

New Business: 1) Treasurer Hughes inquired about getting more Club shirts. Mark Kephart is our Club contact and he was unable to attend tonight. The last time we made the purchase the Club covered \$13 and the new member covered \$13. We will follow up with Kephart.

2) Pine View Farms contacted Secretary O'Keefe on the Facebook page. The sender had purchased a medal created by Magic Empire honoring past President FL Kretschmar. The sender is willing to part with it and is going to meet O'Keefe at one of the upcoming coin shows to make a deal.

Show and Tell: President Shoaf showed a Brashers Doubloom Book. Ron Trezell presented an altered 1853 quarter. Secretary O'Keefe showed a collection of miscellaneous exonumia. Fred Callicoat showed 10 pieces of Mexican silver he picked up in Chupps Auction, a few pieces of Oklahoma gold back notes, and a ring that might have an amount of gold within.

Auction: President Shoaf acted as auctioneer. 5 pieces exchanged hands. Ron Trezell also brought several Dansco albums and blue books to sell. Proceeds went to the Club.

August Meeting

The crux of the meeting was preparation for the Fall 2025 ONA Coin Show in Broken Arrow. Assignments and needed equipment were discussed, along with a timetable for members to show up. Club members were encouraged to wear their Magic Empire shirts.

September 16

The meeting was opened at 6pm. President Greg Shoaf welcomed the 12 members in attendance and led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance

Previous Minutes: Secretary Tim O'Keefe gave a brief overview of the August minutes. There was a motion by Treasurer Phill Hughes to accept the minutes as presented, seconded by Ron Trezell. Motion passed.

Telephone Report: Secretary Tim O'Keefe sent out the texts and email announcing tonight's meeting.

Old Business: 1) The group discussed the many positives of the World's Fair of Money coming to Oklahoma. The American Numismatic Association was impressed with the actions of the ONA, the Oklahoma City Coin Club (host club), and the 8 clubs under the ONA umbrella.

Volunteers were competent and readily available throughout the event. We talked about the purchases we made, the connections we established, and the sheer volume of the five day event. The ANA has promised to make a return trip in the future.

2) The Fall 2025 ONA Coin Show was a mixed bag this year. Some dealers did very well, and some did not. Attendance was down (around 300 total). Magic Empire volunteers helped keep things moving smoothly. Volunteers assisted with set up and break down, manned the desk, and kept the Courtesy Room stocked. Particular thanks go to President Shoaf and Katie Hendricks for keeping the coffee and baked goods coming (and a special thank you to Katie's grandmother for doing the baking). NewsOn6 did a remote video on Saturday which did get the dealers attention. The ONA will decide if we return to the same venue next year and has some choices to make about advertising.

Show & Tell: Fred Callicoat showed a Red Seal 1963 Series five dollar star note that he won off the Whatnot site, and a Vatican City 2 lira piece. President Shoaf presented the 2025 Proof Morgan and Peace dollars. The San

Francisco mint will no longer produce coins and is going back to its original function as an assay office. Treasurer Hughes showed a 'green rattler' case and showed ways to store them efficiently in plastic carriers. Secretary O'Keefe met with Magic Empire dealer Richard McPheeters at the World's Fair of Money. McPheeters purchased former Magic Empire President Ron Lawrence's collection upon his passing. One of the items was Ron's Magic Empire silver presidential medal. O'Keefe bought the medal and showed it tonight. This medal is a big part of Club history. If anyone has access to any of the other ones that were issued please contact O'Keefe.

Auction: We had a few items exchange hands. President Shoaf acted as auctioneer.

Close: The next meeting of the MECC is set for 6pm on Tuesday October 21 at Harvard Avenue Baptist Church. There was a motion by President Shoaf to close the meeting, seconded by Ron Trezell. Motion passed. The official meeting was closed at 7:17pm.



What We Collect

I believe it was in 2023 when I was informed that the American Numismatic Association was going to be holding its World's Fair of Money in Oklahoma City in the summer of 2025. I was attending an Oklahoma City Coin Club meeting when Ben Swagerty (LM-210) and Tyler Tyson (LM-262) made the announcement. A request was made for volunteers to work the show, and I could not get my hand raised fast enough. They also requested volunteers from other clubs from around the state. I was able to recruit Phill Hughes from Tulsa's Magic Empire Coin Club, along with Buddy Forbes (LM-282) of Muskogee's Indian Capitol Coin Club.

As August drew near, I was able to take a week off from work. Because of my availability, Tyler had me named Chairman of the Competitive Exhibits. This sounds a lot more flattering than the actual work involved. I spent my five days handing out ballots for civilians entering the exhibit

area so they could vote for their favorite display. My job was to count the votes each morning and keep the running tally. Phill and Buddy helped out the last few days so we could take turns being gatekeepers and exploring the bourse floor.

The exhibits were intriguing, ranging from Liberty Seated coins (overall first place), elongated coins, Buffalo nickels, foreign coins, tokens, Presidential papers, and a ton of great information. Over 600 votes were cast, though the final tally was 589 as some folks dropped blank ballots into the box (and one person actually voted for the ballot box itself). ANA President -Elect Mark Leatherman frequented the exhibit area all week, which was run by ANA Governor Donna Moon. Several of the show's dignitaries wandered through the exhibit area every day, so I was able to meet many of the famous folks in our hobby.

The first order of business for

myself was to track down the Executive Currency table. I purchased a high dollar national bank note from them last year. Fred Bart out of Roseville, Michigan is one of the national experts in the field. While I anxiously anticipated receiving the note, fate had other ideas. United States Postal Service Tracking showed the item arrived in a Detroit Post Office a day or so after mailing. Unfortunately, that was the last anyone ever saw of the package. Claims were filed with USPS and Ebay, which took months to handle. Bianca Bart was extremely helpful and diligent during the ordeal. This spring a Postal Inspector advised

that the item had been declared lost and they closed the case. Executive Currency was able to refund a good part of the purchase, and for that I am very grateful. I met with Bianca and was able to express my appreciation in person.

The bourse floor was filled every day of the conference. Claremore dealer Richard McPheeters (LM-36) and Muskogee dealer Mike McClendon (LM-281) both had to return home mid-Show to obtain more inventory. There were 500 tables on the floor and everyone was busy buying and selling. My schedule at the Exhibit area did not allow me to start searching



and buying until Thursday afternoon. That did not go as planned, as just about every row I went down had someone I knew. I did a ton of visiting and heard great things about the ONA. The funny thing was that the majority of my purchases were from Eastern Oklahoma dealers who were buying new inventory. I did check in with several national note dealers but could not locate any desirable pieces. Oklahoma notes were far and few between, and the one bill I did purchase

(First National Bank of Guymon) was from McPheeters. I also picked up some Canadian pieces from Tulsa dealer Dale Schaffer (LM-94). My collecting tastes get diverse sometimes.

The ANA officials raved about the volunteers. Our folks stayed on post and performed the necessary functions. The distinctive green "VOLUNTEER" shirts were sharp. Marvin Johnson (LM-252) and Brian Miller (#1642) helped quite a bit at the

Admissions Desk. James and Amanda Collins (LM-289 & LM-299) were wandering the floor giving volunteers breaks. Dennis Beasley (#1728) and his wife sat at the ONA table giving out membership applications and some of Tyler's elongated cents. And it was fun to watch Richard Laster (#1783) bouncing the large beach ball of the world with kids who were able to win foreign coins. The Saturday Kids Zone was extremely popular and several ONA members helped keep the good times flowing.

On the collector's side, I was most impressed with the physical exhibits. One of the very



few known 1804 dollars was on display. The Idler/Bebee Specimen Type 3 was actually struck in the 1850s. There was also one of the five known 1913 Liberty nickels in the same showcase. These items are legendary and I never thought I would get to see them up close. I have the set of Liberty nickels (1883-1912) which is in BU (Beat Up). My 1913 piece has the obligatory "COPY" etched into the reverse. That's as close as I will ever come to numismatic fame.

Tokens were very popular at the Show. James Collins was able to purchase several of the ONA silver and bronze sets from the 1980s and 1990s. If you have a source for more, contact him through the OKC Coin Club. Richard McPheeters said most of his sales involved tokens. Mike McClendon passed on to me several counterfeit coins for educational purposes. I plan on a presentation in the future on how to identify fakes. And I saw several members of the Claremore, Muskogee, and Tulsa Clubs frequenting the venue all week.

One of the perks of the Show was picking up related paraphernalia. As a volunteer, I was given a slabbed Oklahoma state quarter and a slabbed 1967 English penny. I picked up an elongated ANA Oklahoma cent. I stood in line for one of the limited edition

(1250 pieces) silver base-metal ANA medals produced for the event. Outgoing President Tom Iman autographed my piece for me. And since I was connected to the Exhibit area, I was given an ANA commemorative recognizing my work. Show & Tell at upcoming coin club meetings is going to be interesting.

Saturday was the close of the Show. We started to tear down the Exhibit area around 3:30pm. ANA representative Paul Hybert had kept vigilance over the display area all week. He was quite knowledgeable on the exhibiting process and rules. Once the exhibitors cleared out Phill Hughes and I began boxing up the endless supply of display cases. Both President Leatherman and Governor Moon said Oklahoma City was a fantastic surprise and they plan on recommending a return trip in the future (they are in Pittsburgh next year, and Chicago the year after).

The ONA and our Oklahoma coin clubs did a fantastic job representing. We presented a positive image with enthusiasm and showed that the State has a genuine interest in the hobby. It was great to be a part of the event. I hope the ANA comes back in a few years so we can do this again.

The Treasure of Ernie's Treehouse

"You are going to work at Ernie's," he said with a smile. The "he" was Tyler Tyson. Tyler was the 2025 Host Chairman of the American Numismatic Association's World's Fair of Money. With such a big event in our state, I decided to take a week off from work and volunteer to help. It was the first day of the show, and my wife, Amanda, and I had just shown up for our shift. Having no idea what Tyler meant by "Ernie's," I asked, "What's Ernie's?"

"Ernie's Treasure Treehouse is the kids' zone at the World's Fair of Money. They have games where the kids compete for Ernie dollars. After they finish playing the games, the kids get to spend their money in the Ernie store. It'll be fun." Amanda and I headed to the back of the Oklahoma City Convention Center, where the kids' zone was set up. As we walked, I thought, "This is going to be terrible. I've got babysitting





duty all week. How will I have time to look for a 55 double die?" I had one thing on my mind by volunteering at the World's Fair of Money – I wanted to shop for a 1955 DDO Lincoln Cent. As a life-long collector of Lincoln Cents, that particular coin has eluded me. I hoped to find one.

We were greeted at the kids' zone by Christian Strayhorn, the Education Director for the ANA. She showed us around and gave us the rules for all the different games – globe catch, coin toss, plinko, cornhole, dice, and duck grab. Each game was designed to teach kids about various aspects of numismatics in a fun and engaging way. Our job was to run

the games and ensure the kids had a great time while learning about coins.

I decided to have fun with it. So, I yelled out like a carnival barker, "Step right up and try your luck at the \$20 duck!" I was referring to the duck grab, where contestants reached into a container full of rubber duckies. Each of the ducks had a number on the bottom which represented an amount of Ernie dollars. It wasn't very long until children were lined up to play the duck game.

"I'm going to find that \$20 duck," one youngster said. I took his ticket and asked, "What's your name, young man?"

"Andy."

"What do you collect?"

"Lincoln Cents."

"Me too!"

"Do you have a 1909 S VDB?"

"Yes, but mine is in terrible shape. I want to find an upgrade."

"I really want a 1955 double die."

"Me too!"

As he continued to play the game, Andy and I talked about our shared interest in Lincoln Cents. His sister was behind him in line, eagerly waiting for her turn. Andy stepped out of line and allowed his sister to play, but he got back in line. For the next hour, he returned again and again, engaging with other kids and sharing his knowledge about coins. I soon realized that he didn't care much about the game but was more interested in talking to a fellow coin collector and sharing his passion with others.

My time with Andy made me realize that numismatics needs young people to survive. Coin collecting is a hobby that lets you hold a piece of history in the palm of your hand. However, we need young collectors to keep the hobby from fading into history. That realization changed the way I thought about spending time at Ernie's Treasure Treehouse. I wasn't just running games. I was investing in the future of numismatics, inspiring a new generation of collectors who will carry on the tradition and passion for coins.

I never found a 1955 DDO Lincoln Cent at the World's Fair of Money, but I found something more valuable. I found a friend.

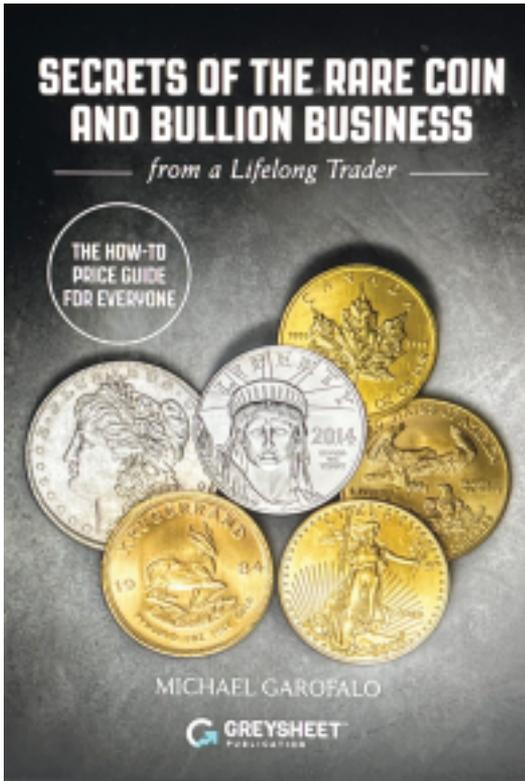
