ONA News

Summer has arrived and the numismatic industry is doing quite well. Business for gold and silver is up, and that is evident from our recent coin shows.

The Spring ONA Show in Moore at the end of April is a fine example. The new venue was well received and I had no complaints from the dealers. Traffic was brisk on Friday, then again on Saturday until about 1pm. Severe inclement weather began approaching the area in the afternoon and the well-grounded fears of tornados diminished our incoming customers. A few of the dealers also closed up early to try and beat the storms home. While the sirens did sound in Moore that evening, the brunt of the atmospheric disturbances went south and north of us. I want to thank Brian Miller and the Oklahoma City Coin Club for their help in making the show a success. I presented them with a \$3000 check at their June meeting for their services. And I cannot say enough good things about the way Bill Norfleet stepped up as bourse chairman and made sure the weekend was a rousing success.

We did hold our bi-annual ONA meeting that Saturday morning. Our first order of business was to recognize Guthrie dealer Scott Thompson of First Capital Coins. We voted in 2023 to reinstate the Annual Okie Award to ONA members who distinguish themselves during the year, bringing credit to the Association. Scott has worked tirelessly to encourage membership in the ONA, including youth memberships. He started the Central Oklahoma Coin Club, whose membership has exploded. He also offers discounts in his shop to ONA members. Scott has provided a positive example to the numismatic community and it was an honor to reward him for his efforts.

On financial matters, Gardner's Tax Service has gone over our records and will have some answers by the end of June. They are working to address the omissions from our prior administration and have assured the problems are manageable. The accountant seems very confident that we can correct the past mistakes and will have us on a course to prevent a repeat of the issue.

President Chris Harrell has announced his intentions to step aside his leadership role with the Association. As he and I signed contracts with the Stoney Creek Hotel and Conference Center in Broken Arrow for the Fall ONA Show back in 2023, we have agreed that he can step down upon the conclusion of that show. We will have our next meeting during that show to discuss our next steps.

Southeast Representative Mike McClendon of Muskogee had to step down from his position. Gary Parson is going to speak to the McAlester Club about providing a replacement. If anyone is interested in filling the vacancy, please contact me.

The floor was open to discussion. We talked about admission fees and it was decided that at the Fall Show we will charge \$5 per adult. (ONA members and people under 18 are admitted free). If the attendee buys something at the show, they will get a full refund at the door. The membership feels this will make the public more receptive to giving their contact information at the registration desk.

The membership anticipates returning to Moore next year. Brian Miller can reserve us the space and a weekend in the Spring. We discussed having food on site (food trucks or open kitchen). There is a second smaller meeting room (which we used for



this meeting) that we discussed using as a secondary room for new dealers, giving them a reduced table price.

Edmond dealer Marvin Thompson is currently storing our ONA trailer on his property. He very cordially towed the trailer to and from the show at the last minute when our original plans fell through. The trailer is in need of new tires and reflectors. We will discuss paying for maintenance and upgrades at the September meeting.

After the meeting I spoke with Brian Miller at length. The Community Center in Moore could host us again in the future and the Parks Department has offered to promote the event in their community activity guide. They will also set up a kitchen on site to service the public and the dealers. There is also a possibility of getting food trucks in the park-

ing lot. Moore would run the kitchen at no cost to us as the event would be considered an "open to the public" community event and there could not be an admission fee. This subject will be on the agenda at the Fall ONA.

I have tried to it to local coin clubs. Recently I have made it to the Muskogee's Indian Capitol Coin Club, the Oklahoma City Coin Club, and my own Magic Empire Coin Club. Enthusiasm for the hobby is still there. With efforts from Scott Thompson and new Lifetime member Sal Oliveri, we have increased ONA membership in all categories (Adult Annual, Youth, and Lifetime). Lifetime member Mike Boyer's NE Oklahoma Coin Show held in June in Tulsa was well attended in its new venue. Everybody please keep up the good work.

Why We Collect

9old is at Record Levels at about \$2400 per ounce. Many people are considering investing in gold as a result. I am being asked again by family and friends how best to do it. Of course you can purchase gold bars or bullion coins, which are readily available at many on line sources, coin shops in your area, or at coin shows. An often over looked way to invest is to purchase collectible gold coins. Often you can buy foreign gold coins and common date U.S. gold coins for a little above gold melt value, which offer an advantage that bullion coins do not afford. Collectable gold coins can have collector value, if not now, they can have in the future. The market for collectible gold is

different than the spot gold market, and can move up or down at different times. Therefore buying collectible gold can act as a hedge in down bullion markets because they might not go down or go down as much and while you are waiting you can enjoy owning an old coin that can be more interesting with a history that you can share with others. I like the St. Gaudens Double Eagles! Just be sure you are buying certified coins or buying from a dealer that guarantees their coins.

I appreciate their thoughtfulness. The book is a must if you have interest in inns of the British Isles. I was also unable to attend the May 21 meeting due to a work commitment. I was advised that there was a small turnout, so a formal meeting was not held.

The June 18, 2024 meeting was opened at 6pm by President Greg Shoaf who welcomed 12 members and two guests in attendance. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Previous Minutes: As there was a gap in meetings, previous minutes were not read tonight.

Telephone Report: Mrs. Sayko made all of the necessary calls to the membership.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Mark Kephart advises the bank account is sound and all bills are paid.

Old Business: James Eklof is in Colorado Springs, CO at the ANA Summer Seminars. We look forward to a report of his activities in July.

The Spring Oklahoma Numismatic Association Show held in Moore, OK in April was a success. Members and dealers of the MECC were both in attendance. The ONA plans to be in the same location next year.

ONA member Mike Boyer ran his Northeast Oklahoma Coin Show at the Tulsa Marriott earlier this month. Several of our member dealers set up, and most of the club went by to add to their collections.

New Business: The Fall ONA Show at Stoney Creek Hotel in Broken Arrow is still on track to happen. The venue will be open for set up after 1pm on Thursday September 5, and the show will run September 6-8. We will advertise for Youth Exhibits in the com-

ing weeks and will again offer cash prizes to the participants.

Open Discussion: President Shoaf brought up the issue of changing the fee on our auction items from 3% to 5%. The membership talked about the pros and cons of doing so. Upon completion, there was a motion made by Andrew Dearman to call for a vote, seconded by Gary Harris. The motion to increase to 5% was passed by unanimous vote

President Shoaf then brought up the matter of Lifetime memberships. Secretary O'Keefe advised that we have had the ability to have Lifetime memberships in the Club, but no one has ever taken advantage of the perk. President Shoaf wanted to establish at least a financial threshold so that it would be an available option for people interested in such status. The group settled on \$100 for a Lifetime membership. There was a motion for a vote called by Andrew Dearman, seconded by John Sayco. The motion passed unanimously.

Show & Tell: Phill Hughes brought a 1955 double die Lincoln cent, along with a 'poor mans' 1955 double die cent. He anticipates sending his in for certification.

Ron Haas had a 1723 George I two pence coin wit Rosa American on the reverse.

Rick Wellnitz showed a counterfeit an encased American Eagle. He showed how to determine both the authenticity of the coin and the holder.

Gary Harris presented a 1791 Colonial Washington coin with a large eagle on the reverse.

Tim O'Keefe came across a copper-plated 1943 Lincoln cent. The group discussed why it was not authentic. He also presented a short set of coins and currency from Bermuda.

Close: As we ran late tonight, the Club decided not to hold the auction. The next meeting of the MECC will be at 6pm on Tuesday July 16 at Harvard Avenue Baptist Church, 3235 East 17 Street in Tulsa. With no further business, there was a motion by Andrew Dearman to close the meeting, seconded by Phill Hughes. The meeting ended at 7:30pm

What We Collect

I was recruited by the Tulsa Police Department in the winter of 1982 out of Indiana University. I arrived in town during February of that year and have remained in the area ever since. Tulsa has become my adopted hometown and has become the base for my coin collecting for the past 42 years, so I figured it was time to talk about the national notes of the Oil Capital of The World. Tulsa had 13 national banks during the period of 1899 to 1935, so lets take a look at all of them.

The First National Bank of Tulsa was assigned Charter 5171 in Indian Territory in January of 1899, barely a year after the City of Tulsa was incorporated. According to the Don Kelly book * there are three known Indian Territory notes that have been documented. There are 21 known large size State issues. In September 1928, the charter name changed to the First National Bank and Trust Company of Tulsa. During the small size period of 1929-1935,

the bank issued only Type I \$50s and \$100s. The bank was located at 200 South Main Street. In 1948 the institution moved to a new skyscraper at 500 South Boston Avenue. In my travels I was lucky enough to obtain a bank box (with the key!) from the original bank with the second title.

Charter 5732 began life in March of 1901. Kelly shows only one Indian Territory note to be reported. The City National Bank of Tulsa was short-lived and was liquidated in April 1908. This one was followed by the Farmers National Bank of Tulsa. Charter 6669 started in March 1903, also struggled, and went out of business in January 1910. There are no known notes out there.

Next up was Charter 8552, the Central National Bank of Tulsa. Chartered just prior to Oklahoma achieving Statehood, this institution fared better as it lasted from February 1907 until November 1930. In January of 1929 it became the Central National



Bank and Trust Company of Tulsa. Kelly shows 2 known Indian Territory issues and 17 State issues. The bank did not issue any small size notes prior to liquidation.

The Exchange National Bank of Tulsa was a more prolific issuer of notes. Chartered as 9658 in February 1910, the bank survived long enough to issue both large (33 known) and small-sized (108 reported) notes during its lifetime. In 1928, the bank moved into its new building at 302 South Boston Avenue, being one of the tallest buildings in Tulsa at the time. The building is still in operation today. The Exchange National Bank only had Type I \$5s, \$10s, and \$20s printed before being liquidated in June 1933. At that time, the bank cashier was E.L. Bradshaw and the president was E.F. Higgins. Apparently they anticipated going out of business, as in April of 1933 the National Bank of Tulsa was chartered (13679) and opened up in

the same offices with Bradshaw and Higgins maintaining their positions. This bank issued all three denominations of Type II notes.

Other short lived banks in town included 9943. The Oklahoma National Bank of Tulsa, chartered March 1911 and liquidated July of 1911, 10262 The Liberty National Bank of Tulsa, chartered September 1912, liquidated January 1924, 10342 The American National Bank of Tulsa, chartered March 1913, liquidated January 1921, 10906 The Union National Bank of Tulsa, chartered September 1916, closed December 1920, 12043 The Security National Bank of Tulsa, chartered November 1921, closed June 1929.

The Oklahoma National Bank of Tulsa has no reported notes, while the other four institutions have a combined population of 11 known large size, a number which may have increased since

the 2006 printing of the Kelly book.

Probably the most successful national bank of the period was the National Bank of Commerce of Tulsa, Charter 9942. The business was put together in March 1911 by James H McBirney. He arrived in Tulsa from Kansas around 1900 and worked for the Tulsa Banking Company until 1911 when he and his brother Sam put together the Bank of Commerce. Their two buildings were located at East 3 Street and

South Main Street. The main building has been renovated and still stands today. The note population shows 7 large sized and a scant 3 small size on the rolls. The Type I \$10 that I have is unreported and dispays James McBiney's signature prominently.. Type I and II \$10s and \$20s were issued by the bank, but not in very large quantities. Mr. McBirney embraced Tulsa and lived here until his death in 1976. The McBirney Mansion is located at the corner of South Galveston Avenue and Riverside Drive just



south of downtown and is one of the more impressive houses in the city. The house is over 12,000 square feet, has four stories, and was built with an elevator. And if you have about \$8 million laying around you can buy the property today.

The final bank to discuss lasted a brief nine years. Charter 12042 was The Producers National Bank of Tulsa. The bank was chartered in November 1921 but was liquidated in September 1930. The bank was in business

long enough to issue Type I \$5s, \$10s, and \$20s. Surprisingly, there are more available specimens from the Producers National Bank than the National Bank of Commerce.

I have been able to obtain specimens from the five Tulsa banks that issued small-sized notes. I have exhibited them at the Tulsa Coin Show and at the Tulsa Community College West Campus. These notes always initiate conversation and awe from the folks who observe them. They bring currency collecting to a local level that people can relate to. I always enjoy talking about the history these items represent. It is also fun to locate a hometown note. If you live in Oklahoma, there are 258 towns that had banks that issued currency (large and/or small sized), so there is a good possibility of finding a note from where you live. Find something you like and collect the heck out of it, and keep living on Tulsa time.



MY FIRST COIN SHOW

My name is Thomas Martin and I went to my first coin show when I was 10 years old on April 27, 2024. When I first walked into the coin show, I was fascinated at the sight of so many tables. So I walked and started looking around. The first person I went to gave me a Sacagawea coin because I was young, then I got a 1966 Canadian .6 ounce coin for only six dollars. I also got an uncirculated Kennedy half dollar. So I looked around some more and ended up going to Mike Yeager. When I went to him, I got a lot of foreign coins. China, Japan, Germany, Italy, France and Jamaica just to name a few. So I got 18 different foreign coins from around the world from Mike Yeager. So I looked around even

more and came to Robert's coins. From them I got 2 US 1994 World Cup coins which I had wanted for about a year.

So I next went to Keith's Coins and they gave a junk bag (please do not take this as offensive) and the junk bag had some plenty interesting coins. So after that we were done and my mom had expected us to be at the coin show for about 30 minutes, but instead we spent about 2 hours there. CODE OF ETHICS OF THE OKLAHOMA NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION

Membership in the Oklahoma Numismatic Association is a privilege extended to those persons and organizations deemed worthy thereof and is not a matter of right. Such membership can be maintained only until the Board of Directors determines that the conduct of a member has been such that, in the best interest of the Association, such membership should be terminated.

For the guidance of its members, this Code of Ethics has been duly adopted by the Board of Directors under the authority vested in it by the Oklahoma Numismatic Association Bylaws. A breach thereof by any member reflects, directly or indirectly, upon all members. Such a breach shall be considered conduct prejudicial to the welfare of the Association and cause for action by the Board of Directors.

As a Member of the Oklahoma Numismatic Association:
