O'Keefe welcomed the 10 members and one guest in attendance.

Old Business: Scheduling conflicts prevented the Sub-committee Meeting on the Bylaws from occurring September 10 and 11. As for the reason for the meeting, S/T O'Keefe reviewed the bylaws. There is no written procedure for or against members selling coins during the meeting. Any member wishing to formally address the issue may bring it up at the October meeting for further discussion or action.

New Business: 1) The Club welcomed new member Robert Deco. 2) Tulsa Community College West Campus is doing a library theme on Tulsa of the 1920s. S/T O'Keefe has two cases on display showcasing the five national banks that were operating in Tulsa at that time. He is

## Tulsa Coin Show:

3) Thank you to volunteers Mark Kephart, Ron Lawrence, Bo Hurt, and Sheryl Morgan for helping at the front desk.

#### Show & Tell:

Robert Decou showed an 1885-CC Morgan dollar in mirror-like proof condition. Ron Lawrence presented four silver coins from the British reign of William & Mary, including a 1689 three pence, a 1692 groat, a 1692 shilling, and a 1689 half crown. Gary Harris showed a half penny conder token from Norwich, England from 1792.

Educational Presentation: S/T O'Keefe gave a talk on his hometown of Norwich, Connecticut, beginning with its settlement in the early 1600s, relationships with the local Native Americans (Mohegan and Pequot tribes), and the importance of the area during the Revolutionary War. Norwich was the birthplace of Benedict Arnold. It was also home to Samuel Huntington, who signed the Declaration of Independence, was President of the Continental Congress, and was a Connecticut Governor. O'Keefe presented an 1855 note

from The Thames Bank, which later became The Thames National Bank (Charter 657). He gave a brief history of the eight national banks to operate in Norwich from 1864-1935. He also discussed the importance of Bela Pratt Lyon, who was born in Norwich in 1867. As well as being a talented sculptor, he went on the design gold coins for the US Mint starting in 1907 and was the first artist to incorporate incuse designs on coins in this country. O'Keefe showed a 1912 gold quarter eagle that is credited to Pratt. O'Keefe also displayed a map of Norwichtown Green from the late 1770s as well as two books on Norwich history from former Connecticut State Senator Bill Stanley.

The October 2021 meeting of the MECC was opened at 6:10pm by Secretary/Treasurer Tim O'Keefe who welcomed twelve members and two guests to the proceedings. President Chris Harrell and Vice President Todd Hourihan were unable to make tonight's meeting.

Gary Harris presented a new reverse 2021 silver eagle

Keith Morgan had a set of Russian copper-nickel commemoratives from the early 1990s that depicted several scenes from Russian history.

Ron Haas had a certified 1794 1 cent piece of Talbot, Allum. & Lee of New York

Tim O'Keefe presented a short set

of Philippine currency from the 1880s to the 1990s, along with guerrilla currency used during the Japanese invasion of World War II.

George Lee and Gary Harris both showed some nice coins from their personal collections.

**Auction:** Keith Morgan was auctioneer. The only two items that sold belonged to S/T O'Keefe, who donated the winnings to the Club's charitable fund. We will have a final total on the 2021 Charitable Fund at the November meeting.

Educational Presentation: James

Eklof had a detailed report on the history of the New Orleans Mint, discussing its architecture, its various uses over the years, its takeover by the Confederacy in the 1860s, and some other fun facts about the facility. A series of New Orleans coins ("O" mint mark) were shown to enhance the talk (Liberty Seated 1/2 dimes, Liberty Seated and Barber dimes, Barber quarter dollars, Liberty Seated and Barber half dollars, and Morgan silver dollars).

Show & Tell: Bobby Decou had an ultra cameo/deep cameo 1884-CC Morgan dollar graded by ANACS.

Ron Lawrence showed some older Mexican coins.

John Sayko had a collection of "S" and "W" Washington quarters from the past 10 years



# Why We Collect

**P**

erhaps the most prolific Chief Mint Engraver in U.S. history, Longacre was born in 1794 in Pennsylvania. I counted about 30 different U.S. coin types he was responsible for creating. He was our 4th chief engraver, serving from 1844 until he died in office in 1869. We know him best for the Flying Eagle and Indian cent and he created several of the odd denomination types in the mid-nineteenth century like the three cent pieces. Many know him best for creating the first Double Eagle Type, the Liberty Head, and all three of the gold dollar types. Longacre was a busy man!

He was born and raised in Pennsylvania at a time of great change in our nations history starting with the California gold rush in 1849 and through the Civil War. Longacre showed artistic talent at a young age. He was gifted at drawing and learned to engrave artistic plates to create portraiture's in his first employment. He excelled at this work and made his living in this way until he went to work for U.S. Mint. His experience was probably best suited for making

banknote plates. He had to learn die making for coinage. Fortunately, his first few years of employment were relatively quiet which gave him time to learn. His designs and types were relatively simple and made in low relief to save die life. Remember he was making coins for circulation and not medals. Dies were made by hand in his day and were an expensive part of the process. During his time experimentation with nickel as a coinage metal started. Nickel is very hard compared to other coinage metals of the day. It was very difficult strike and resulted in an expensive reduction in die life. He was greatly challenged at times in his career but he persevered and went on to create our first five cent nickel in 1866. The Shield nickel, which is 25% nickel and 75% copper, is still with us today even though the design has changed several times. Longacre produced many of our most popular coins. What is

yours? Mine is the Indian cent,  
which I have collected my whole  
life. When you know the rest of  
the story our coins come alive! IS

# What We Collect

**I** had been chomping at the bit to get out of town and do research on some of my Oklahoma national bank notes. Finally, at the end of September my work schedule eased up enough so that I could slip out of town on a Friday and start my quest for knowledge.

In 2019 I purchased a Series 1929 Type II note of The First National Bank of Guthrie from California dealer William Litt. Mr. Litt is a Governor for the Society of Paper Money Collectors and always has a diverse selection of nationals on his website. I had been looking for a Guthrie note because Charter 4346 was the first chartered bank in Oklahoma. I was able to obtain a dog-eared and stained Type I note from a shop in Tulsa but was on the prowl for a better specimen. The note from Mr. Litt was in much better shape. I was even more surprised to find that there are no notes of the \$20 denomination listed on the Don Kelly census. I have been collecting nationals since 2013 and this was the first time I had

encountered this phenomenon. So with this in mind, I headed west to Guthrie.

I can't say that I really had a plan as I headed north on I-35. I branched off at Highway 77 and let google lead me into the downtown area. The first thing that stood out is that almost all of the old section of town is done in red brick, including some of the paved streets. There are historical marker signs along most of the curbs describing buildings or locations. Guthrie seems rightly very proud of its heritage.

I wandered down East Oklahoma Avenue and by pure chance came across The Oklahoma Territorial Museum. That seemed like a good place to start, so I parked out front and went in. I explained to the administrative assistant that I was looking for information on The First National Bank of Guthrie. She was very helpful and cordial, explaining that they do not get many requests for local bank information. She said

there might be a file and asked me to explore the multiple floors of the Museum while I waited. A few minutes later she emerged with a legal-sized file folder that contained all sorts of goodies and tidbits. She led me to a table where I could spread out and I began to pour through the papers and articles within.

Guthrie was located in the Oklahoma Territory in the late 1800s prior to Statehood (1907). The famous Oklahoma Land Run was held here in April 1889 as Congress authorized the opening up of land for settlement. 50,000 to 75,000 people took part in the event, with about 1 in 3 actually filing for land grants. Guthrie was the original capitol of Oklahoma. With the influx of people, there was also created a need for other shops, amenities, and resources. The McNeal-Little Banking Company was established in April 1889 by JW McNeal. He served as president

from 1889 to 1903. On June 24, 1890, the bank was granted Charter 4346 and changed to The Guthrie National Bank. Other banks spread up during the same period, including The Bank of Indian Territory and The National Bank of Commerce. On December 21, 1911, these three banks combined as one under Charter 4346. On December 9, 1912, the charter name was changed to become The First National Bank of Guthrie.

As I went through the paperwork, I came across a typed report on an attempted bank robbery dated August 17, 1902. It seems that an intrepid crew of bandits gained access to the barber shop adjacent to the bank and started to cut a hole in the wall. For unknown reasons, they abandoned their attempt after cutting through, either because they feared being discovered or because they had not brought the correct tools to dig further



through the brick wall they encountered. Had they continued, they would have been even more disappointed, as a steel wall lay beyond that one. They left behind the tools they had used, and according to the article, the would-be thieves were never identified. The original bank vault is still there today.

While going through my Series 1929 Oklahoma notes, I began logging and listing the signatures for the bank cashiers and presidents. The Guthrie notes I have both have the bank president's signature of 'N. Holman'. While doing my inventory of personal notes I discovered that The Liberty National Bank of Oklahoma City, Charter 11230, had the same signature of 'N. Holman'. The file from the

Museum showed this to be Ned Holman of Guthrie. He was the vice president and cashier of The National Bank of Commerce starting in February 1910. When the banks combined in 1911, he became president of the FNB of Guthrie, a position he held through 1953. Mr. Holman seems to have been a banking pioneer in central Oklahoma, important enough to be president over two banks at the same time.

I spoke with the Museum's Assistant Curator, Michael Williams, while sorting through the pictures and articles. He said that the Museum did not have much in the way of numismatic items from the late 19th and early 20th centuries. In the collection of papers I found a cancelled check for \$6.30 written on 'The Bank of





Indian Territory Guthrie, OK' dated March 10, 1900. Mr. Williams located a Series 1902 large -sized \$5 with crumbling edges. He said it was donated to the museum a few years earlier. In one of their displays they had an assemblage of late 19th century coins including some Indian Head cents, a couple Liberty nickels, a few Barber dimes, and a twenty -cent piece. All were heavily circulated.

During my travels of the past few years I was able to obtain a canvass bank bag from the FNB of Guthrie which dates to the 1930s. At the Tulsa Coin Show in 2020 I purchased a yard-long photograph of Guthrie in the 1910s from Oklahoma dealer Marvin Johnson. Yard-longs are vista photographs that are about 3 feet in length featuring a skyline or a very large group photo. I had it

framed and donated it to the Museum, as I have a sense of putting things back where they belong.

I spent the afternoon like a kid in the candy store, pouring over the records and gathering what information I could. Mr. Williams provided excellent assistance, and I made a connection. I promised to be on the lookout for other Guthrie notes, and he promised to call if he needed help with coins or currency he came across. I highly recommend checking out the Oklahoma Territorial Museum whether you are a Sooner, a Boomer, a coin collector, or just curious about Oklahoma history. And remember, find something you like and collect the heck out of it.
