Magic Empire Coin Club Minutes

The June 2018 meeting of the MECC was opened at 7:03pm by President Chris Harrell and he welcomed the ten members in attendance. President Harrell asked for a reading of the May 2018 minutes. Secretary Tim O'Keefe read the minutes. There was a motion to accept the minutes as read by Shane Cornell, which was seconded by Sheryl Morgan.

Treasurer's Report- Deferred to the July 2018 meeting.

Telephone Report: Sheryl Morgan advised that she had contacted all members.

Drawings: Won by Sheryl Morgan and Shane Cornell.

Old Business: There seems to be an issue with the e-mail. Secretary/Treasurer O'Keefe will look into it.

Tulsa Coin Show Report: Sheryl Morgan has volunteered to help work the front door, and we could always use more people. There was a lengthy discussion about advertising for the show.

New Business: President Harrell has suggested that we do some school presentations in the fall to attract young collectors to the hobby. Both he and S/T O'Keefe have contacts at some local schools that may be interested. The Denver Mint and the American Numismatic Association are known to have free educational materials available. Keith Morgan was going to inquire further in this matter.

Educational Presentation: S/T O'Keefe gave a talk on British Commonwealth coins in Hong Kong. Areas called the Kowloon Peninsula and Stonecutter Island were ceded to the British after the Opium Wars of 1839-1842. The area was leased to the British in 1896 for 100 years. British decimal coinage was issued starting in 1863 bearing the visage of the current monarch (Queen Victoria in this case), and this continued through 1992. With anticipation of the area going back to Chinese rule, the obverses were changed to various flowers through 1997. Coins were minted in England at the Heaton (H) and Kings Norton (KN) mints in Birmingham. 5 cent, 10 cent, 20 cent, 50 cent, and

dollar pieces circulated with a silver content of .8 (.3492 oz.) from the early 1870s to 1935. From 1895 to 1935, the English government, in an attempt to compete with the silver Mexican peso, issued British Trade Dollars for circulation in the Orient. With an ASW of .780, most of the coins were minted in Bombay (B) and Calcutta (C), India, except for 1925 and 1930, when they were produced in London. O'Keefe brought examples of eight, including one with chop marks. He also showed most of the coinage varieties and several Hong Kong notes

Show & Tell: Ron Lawrence showed four half crown coins, including a 1712 Queen Ann, a 1689 William & Mary, and two versions of the 1817 George III issues.

Chris Casey brought a slabbed 1901-O Morgan dollar rated MS-64 by PGCS, and some Mercury dimes he came across from a family member.

Tim O'Keefe attended the International Paper Money Show in Kansas City on June 9. He met paper currency expert Don C Kelly, who autographed his copy of "National Bank Notes" (sixth edition).

Close: The next meeting of the MECC is set for July 26 at 7pm at

Hardesty Library. An auction is planned for the evening.

The July 2018 meeting of the MECC was opened at 7:00 pm by President Chris Harrell and he welcomed the ten members and three guests in attendance. President Harrell asked for a reading of the June 2018 minutes. Secretary/Treasurer Tim O'Keefe read the minutes. There was a motion to accept the minutes as read by Keith Morgan, which was seconded by Shane Cornell.

Treasurer's Report- The clubs post office box has been paid up through July 2019. Ron Lawrence was reimbursed for purchasing program prizes.

Why We Collect

One of the more unusual coins listed in "Guide Book of US Coins" i.e RED BOOK is listed as "Kentucky Token", in the post colonial section. Collected as an early Colonial Copper, evidence shows this piece was actually made in England circa 1792 - 1794. During this period in England a shortage of small denomination coins existed and many tokens were made to facilitate trade by private makers. There is no evidence that this token circulated in the American colonies including Kentucky.

The first reference I could find that mentions this coin is Crosby's, "Early Coins of America" published in 1875. Therefore the coin was known in America and collected by early collectors because of it's design.

On the obverse is the legend UNANIMITY is strength of Society. The central design shows a hand holding a scroll which reads our cause is just. The reverse is where the American colonies are clearly shown with a pyramid with 15 starburst surrounded by rays. Each star in the triangle represents a colony or state, identified by it's initial letter. The coin is called Kentucky coin or cents because the let-


ter K (for Kentucky) happens to be at top of Pyramid.

They were most likely made as collectibles which were popular with English collectors and others at the time. Red book estimates that about 1,000 pieces exist today, making these pieces scarce.

I have always had an interest in this unusual coin, and have tried to acquire an example. They tend to bring more in auctions and at shows than listed values. Recently I acquired a piece, unexpectedly, in a hoard of English trade tokens. Mine is a great example with very fine details but has been lightly cleaned, but shows no other problems.

I would like to know more about it. So this may be a start of research into this little known and studied coin. This is just one of many coins listed in our references that are possible research projects. Another reason this hobby is fun.

What We Collect

Pocket change. That seems to be the easiest way to become a coin collector. Many of us still use cash for everyday transactions, and there is no telling what will turn up. Most cashiers barely notice the money they hand back to you during a sale, aside from counting out the correct amount. I always look forward to this back and forth because things can easily turn into a treasure, and it's a fairly inexpensive way to add to a collection.

When I was in college, I was on the other side of the equation. I worked in a drug store for almost two years, and it was amazing what people would spend for cigarettes. I would take in wheat pennies, silver dimes and quarters, proof coins, and 1934 Series \$5s and \$10s in a regular basis. The first Indian Head cent I ever came across in circulation happened during this period. When these items would present themselves, I would inform the buyer what they were spending. I never had anybody backtrack and give me different money, as the purchase to feed their nicotine habit

was apparently more important than feeding a numismatic fix. My bosses were good with me replacing coins and bills as they came in, as they were not collectors either. Counting out a cash drawer at the end of the night was a highly anticipated chore.

About five years ago, I was visiting my parents in Seymour, Connecticut. We had a meal at Anthony's Pizzeria along Route 8, and I paid for dinner with cash. We were in a hurry, so I did not check my change at the restaurant. About an hour later, I reached into my pocket for some car keys, and heard that familiar clank of silver. It is amazing the difference in sound between a silver coin and a clad coin. Curiously I pulled out the money, and found a 1954 Washington quarter in my hand. That just made the vacation more memorable.

As a long time police officer in Tulsa, Quik Trip was a frequent hang out, particularly early in my career as cell phones were just coming into everyday use. The QT stores were a place to use

a store phone to call in reports, and a haven to write up the paperwork. (Prior to computers, almost all reports were handwritten, and a flat non-moving surface was always preferred to trying to document some crime on the curvature of a steering wheel). I became friendly with several of the attendants on the night shifts, and they knew of my passion for the hobby. I would mostly come up with foreign coins, such as Canadian coinage. One night I ended up with a 1989 Swedish krona, as the attendant did not know what to do with it. Networking is always important.

Quik Trip has always been good to me. This past winter, a friend of mine gave me a brand new empty Whitman folder for Lincoln cents 1909-1940. I stopped collecting those years ago, as I have 99% of the series. But this year I decided to have some fun and try to fill the book from pocket change. So far I've filled 15 slots, with the oldest being a 1913-D. The coins are not in the greatest shape, but the fact that they are still out there makes the quest interesting. QT takes in thousands of coins each day, so the odds are good of coming across an old wheat cent, and most of my finds have come from their stores. About 2 months ago, I was at one of the Sand Springs stores. I received back a blackened nickel in change. The film

was so deep that very little of the coin could be identified with the naked eye. When I got home I pulled out some olive oil and a rag and began to scrape away the topsoil. The coin turned out to be a silver 1942-P Jefferson nickel. Not bad for a 5 cent investment.

The biggest score I have come across recently was at a Mazzio's in Sand Springs. I received back three silver Roosevelt dimes in change one night about a year ago. It makes one wonder if these coins had been rolling around in circulation for years, or if somebody had busted open an old collection. The worst case scenario is that the coins were loot in a theft or a burglary. The problem with coins is that they generally cannot be identified if they are floating around in circulation.

As long as people are using real money to pay for things, the possibility of finding old and valuable coins exists. I like to use cash often, and feel sorry for folks who are hooked on credit card transactions. I do not think anybody gets excited over finding an old credit card receipt, and doubt there is a collector's base for them. Pocket change is a time when the search comes to you, so why not take advantage of it? As always, find something you like and collect the heck out of it.
