Letter from the President

I hope that everyone has had a great holiday season. Hopefully Santa brought you what you were looking for this Christmas. If he brought coal, then be sure to check the upcoming coin shows in the back of the Mint Luster and snag it yourself at the next show.

Speaking of which, we have an exciting and important change to the 2019 Tulsa ONA Show. The Tulsa Show will be held at the new Stoney Creek Hotel and Conference Center near Bass Pro Shop on Broken Arrow Expressway. We will have the show September 6-8 and the address is 200 W Albany St, Broken Arrow, OK 74012. The new venue will allow us to accept more dealers and the location should help increase attendance. We will also provide dealers with a room block at the hotel, which can provide them a discounted rate on their stay.

It was brought to my attention by several ONA members that the lack of space at the Elks Lodge forced us to turn many dealers away. There have also been suggestions on how to improve the advertisement of the show to increase attendance. It is encouraging to see the motivation of ONA members to seek ways to build the ONA, local clubs, and show attendance.

After these concerns were brought to my attention, I decided the best course of action was to research alternative locations for the coin show, appoint a committee to discuss our options, and vote on whether to remain at the Elks Lodge or move the show to a new location. I appointed to the committee the Vice President, Past President, Secretary - Treasurer, and the Northeast Representative. The five of us discussed the cost, pros, and cons of moving the show. After discussion, we unanimously decided to move the show to Stoney Creek Hotel. We also agreed that Chris Herrell, President of the Magic Empire Coin Club in Tulsa, will replace retired chairman Dale Schaffer. A special thanks to Dale for serving as the Tulsa Show chairman the past few years. We are also very grateful to the Elks Lodge for hosting us at their facility over the years, and the decision to move was made purely from a desire to increase the number of tables and provide a more spacious atmosphere for the dealers and attendees.

The new venue is more expensive, but we plan to offset the additional cost by selling more tables. Moving the show has a certain degree of financial risk, but the financial position of the ONA is very secure, and we can afford to sustain the show if it puts us in the red a little bit the first year or two. Of course, the goal of the ONA is not to 'profit' from shows, but it is important that the shows bring in enough money for us to sustain the shows, make donations to the local clubs that volunteer to help organize and run the show, and advertise.

We recognize that the dealers must have a successful show, so as the date for the show gets nearer, we will further discuss how to improve our advertising of the Tulsa Show to increase attendance. Having the show at Stoney Creek comes with some additional perks in addition to more space, such as better refreshment options for the dealers, better lighting, and a close

proximity to accommodations – especially for those that stay at Stoney Creek. It is not only important to us that we have many attendees at the shows, but that the dealers have a pleasant experience so that they continue to come back.

Finally, as we head into the ONA election cycle, I want to express my gratitude to my fellow ONA members for allowing me an opportunity to serve as President. We now have a website and information about all our member clubs, club meetings, and coin shows are easily available online. We have seen attendance at the coin shows increase over the last two years, and the ONA membership has been very proactive in advancing the hobby. It has been a pleasure to serve in this organization, and I hope to continue my role for the next two years as the ONA continues to grow and achieve new goals.



Magic Empire Coin Club Minutes

The September 2018 meeting of the MECC was opened at 7:05 pm by President Chris Harrell, who welcomed the 11 members and 4 guests in attendance. President Harrell then asked all in attendance to introduce themselves. President Harrell asked for a reading of the August 2018 minutes. Secretary/Treasurer Tim O'Keefe read the minutes. There was a motion by Chris Casey to accept the minutes as read, which was seconded by Ron Lawrence.

Telephone Report: Sheryl Morgan was unable to attend. She advised S/T O'Keefe prior to the meeting that everyone had been contacted.

Treasurers Report: S/T Tim O'Keefe advised that the bank account sat at \$1340 and that all club bills have been paid to date.

Drawing: Won by Dale Schaeffer.

New Business: President Harrell called a quorum meeting at the Tulsa Coin Show to update dues for the club. Annual individual membership remains at \$10. Annual Youth membership (under 18) is set at \$5. Annual

Husband & Wife is \$15. Annual Family membership (no limit to children) is \$20. Lifetime Individual membership is \$125. Lifetime family membership (Husband & Wife only) is \$150. President Harrell also had an application form printed up explaining the various levels of membership.

Tulsa Coin Show: Dale Schaeffer advised that the show made a small profit. Table revenue was \$5460 with expenses of \$4823, leaving a net profit of \$642. Mr. Schaeffer then presented S/T O'Keefe with a \$500 check from the Oklahoma Numismatic Association derived from the proceeds to be deposited into club coffers.

A refundable deposit check has been given to the Elks Lodge of \$300 for next year's show. The Lodge believes we can increase to 46 tables (40 full tables and 6 corner tables). The Elks did another outstanding job of hosting this year.

Suggestions for next year include: paper name tags for attendees, badges with lanyards

to identify Tulsa magic Empire Club members, possible opening up Friday afternoons to the public to attract more sales, having the Elks advertise the show on their website to their own membership and selling tables on Sunday for a discounted price to late-comers.

New Members: The club welcomed Craig Hurt, Rich Lauchner, James VanHooser, and Youth Member Sloane Harrell.

Auction: The auction took up the rest of the meeting. Several items changed hands, coming to a total of \$442.

Close: The next meeting of the MECC will be 7pm on Thursday October 25, 2018. There was a motion to close the meeting by John Sayco, seconded by Chris Casey. The meeting was closed at 8:50pm.

The October 2018 meeting of the MECC was opened at 7:05 pm by President Chris Harrell, who welcomed the 9 members and 1 guest in attendance. President Harrell asked for a reading of the August 2018 minutes. S/T Tim O'Keefe read the minutes. There was a motion by Alex Edwards to accept the minutes as read, which was seconded by Ron Lawrence.

Telephone Report: Sheryl Morgan was unable to attend.

S/T O'Keefe advised that several members had scheduling conflicts tonight.

Treasurers Report: S/T Tim O'Keefe advised that the bank account is solvent and that all members have paid dues to date.

Drawing: Won by Chris Casey.

New Business: 1) The 57th Annual Comanche County Coin Show is set for November 9th & 10th in Lawton. The membership was encouraged to attend.

2) S/T O'Keefe has contacted the Tulsa City-County Library system to update their website with our current location and club officers.

3) The latest issue of Mint Luster explains the ONA scholarship program. S/T O'Keefe spoke about the program and members Rebecca Edwards and Chris Casey both expressed interest in participating next year.

Open Discussion: The club's annual holiday dinner is coming up. President Harrell opened up the floor for suggestions as to a time and date, and for funding the dinner from the club account. The floor came up with Friday December 14 at Oklahoma Joes Barbeque, 6175 East 61 Street in Tulsa. The time will be determined at the November meeting.

Show & Tell: Ron Lawrence brought an assorted set of coins of Great Britain including an 1811 eighteen pence piece, an 1804 Bank of England dollar, an 1818 crown of George III, and an 1849 florin of Queen Victoria.

Tim O'Keefe brought a series of British-themed coins from the Mediterranean and Middle East, including colonial coinage of Malta (1/3 farthing pieces featuring George IV (1827), William IV (1834), Queen Victoria (1881), Edward VII (1902), and George V (1913)); three coins from British Military rule of the Ioanian Islands; and coins of British Protectorate States of Palestine, Egypt, and South Arabia.

Educational Presentation: Our guest speaker for the evening was Mike Anderson of Tulsa Gold & Silver located at 6357 East 41 Street. Mr. Anderson explained to the group about some of his buying experiences in the store and he brought several items that he has obtained with related stories including a "Good for 2 cents except on Saturday and Sunday" token from the long-gone Lyric Theater that was located at 103 South Main Street in Tulsa. He brought a piece of fractional currency, a Hard Time token from Germany, a wooden bank note advertised as a wooden nickel from Fredericksberg, Kentucky, a Prussian coin with

dual monarchs featured on the obverse, and an explanation and example of 6 pence pieces and why people want them for their weddings.

Old Business: Member Keith Morgan came in late. He received an educational packet from the ANA which included books and pamphlets. He turned the items over to S/T O'Keefe.

Close: With Thanksgiving being the 4th Thursday of November, the next meeting will be held at 7pm on Thursday November 15 at Hardesty Regional Library. An auction is planned for the evening. There was a motion by Chris Casey to close the meeting, seconded by John Sayco. The meeting was closed at 8:05pm.

The November 2018 meeting of the MECC was opened at 7:05 PM by S/T Tim O'Keefe, acting as Chair for the absent President Chris Harrell and Vice President John Sands. He welcomed the 15 members in attendance.

Drawing: Won by Art Roslewski.

Old Business: 1) O'Keefe contacted the Tulsa Library system, and our contact data for the club has been updated on their website.

2) O'Keefe has reserved Library rooms for all of 2019. The Library will continue to rotate us as space is available. The building is

booked for the February meeting, though the Library believes they can accommodate us. We also have the option of moving the meeting time to 6:45 PM.

3) The Club's holiday dinner will be at the Bread And Butter restaurant at 3837 East 51st Street in Tulsa at 6PM on Friday December 7, 2018.

New Business: 1) The Club has discussed changing the venue of the Fall Tulsa Coin Show. President Harrell and member Todd Hourihan are working on the logistics. The ONA is supporting the move. Many details still have to be worked out.

2) January 24, 2019 is the date of our next regularly scheduled meeting, and it will also be our annual Board Of Directors meeting. As such, the floor will be open for new officers. Todd Hourihan has advised he will be running for Vice President. He also suggested that we consider changing our meeting time to earlier, and that we may move a meeting or two in 2019 to another location to possibly spur more membership.

3) Shane Cornell advised that the ONA will be holding officer elections in the Spring of 2019.

4) The 7th Annual Black Friday Coin Show will be held November 23 & 24 at the

Glenpool Convention Center located near Highway 75 and E 121 Street South. Friday is noon to 5, and Saturday is 9am to 5pm.

Show & Tell: Art Roslewski showed a series of World War II United States notes, including notes issued for Hawaii and Africa, along with some gold certificates.

Ron Lawrence showed some foreign coins, including a 1777 four reales piece of Bolivia, an 1808 reales piece of Bolivia, a Republic of China 1986 two thousand yuan piece, and Central American republic 1840 eight reales piece.

Zack Shultze showed a short collection of US coins, including two 1921 Peace dollars, a 1932 Washington Quarter, some Mercury dimes, a barber half dollar, along with a Mexican 2 reales piece of 1793. He was also presented with two blue books of Canadian nickels from the Club.

Tim O'Keefe presented a short series of coins of the Philippines minted prior to 1950, including some that were minted in San Francisco and the 1946 Douglas MacArthur commemoratives.

Todd Hourihan announced that he had completed his classic silver commemorative collection of 144 coins, most in graded condition.

Auction: The scheduled auction started at 7:45 with Keith Morgan acting as auctioneer. Over 40 items changed hands. Sheryl Morgan provided outstanding baked goods throughout the meeting.

Close: The auction ran right up to 8:45 as the Library prepared to close. There will be no December meeting. We will reconvene at 7pm on Thursday January 24,

2019 at Hardesty Regional Library.

What We Collect

While I had planned on doing a lot of traveling upon my retirement last year, my new schedule has kept me busier than anticipated, so my excursions out of town have been kept to a minimum. My best getaway so far was in early June of this year to the International Paper Money Show in Kansas City, Missouri. This was the second year it has been held there since moving from Memphis, Tennessee. I have been to several coin shows across the country, but never to one specifically centered on currency, and certainly not to one of this scope and magnitude.

Finding the Sheraton Crown Center Hotel was fairly easy off of I-71 in the downtown area. There was a mechanical problem with the automated parking system, so I ended up paying \$15 instead of the actual \$10 fee, but that was made up for at the door as I entered the show, as someone slipped me a \$5 discount pass for entry. Registration was a breeze, the information pamphlets and floor map were extremely helpful, and I was impressed to see

several members of the Kansas City Police Department there for security purposes.

One of the goals I had at the show was to put names to faces. I have used the internet for a few years now, and really wanted to meet the folks I have been doing business with all of this time. My first stop was at Bill Litt's table. He operates out of California (Litt Currency), and is involved in local government there. He always has a wide assortment of affordable national bank notes. I introduced myself and he recognized my name immediately. Bill was shorter than I had envisioned (I guess the internet makes you taller) but very cordial. He did not have any of the Connecticut notes that I was searching for, but he knew exactly who to send me to.

The dealer he directed me towards was located on the far side of the room. He was from Colchester, Connecticut, which is about 15 minutes from where I grew up in Norwich. However, he was not there. My timing in arrival was poor, as there was a

dealers meeting going on in another portion of the complex. The dealer's son, who hails from Florida, was tending the table. He did not seem to know much about Connecticut or nationals, but he did know where the stash of Connecticut nationals was hidden. I zeroed in on two of them immediately- both 1929 Series Type I notes, one from Middletown (Charter 397) and the other from Ansonia (Charter 1093). I attended 7th grade in Middletown, and my folks lived in Ansonia when I was born. Both charters are difficult to find. Without the main dealer there I could not dicker on the prices, so I probably paid up, but I'm not complaining.

Next I went in search of Gary Paetti. He operates Long Island Numismatics in New York and advertises frequently on "Collector's Corner" on the net, and has an extensive inventory. I had actually purchased a Connecticut note from him online earlier in the week, and had not heard from him, which was unusual until I surmised he was in Kansas City. We started talking, and I found that he lives near my parents in Southwestern Connecticut. We then began discussing our individual collections. I mentioned that I also collect the small series of Rhode Island national notes. Gary is amassing an amazing collection

of Rhode Island notes. (Visit his site: LINUXMIS.com). When he asked me why I collect them, I said partially because I spent a lot of time in the Ocean State while growing up, and because there are only 12 small size charters (10 of which I have represented). That stopped him in his tracks. Gary asserted that he was an authority on Rhode Island notes, and that there were more than 12 small size charters. I then named off all twelve (7 in Providence, 2 in Newport, and 1 each in Ashaway, Slatersville, and West Warwick). He looked at me incredulously, then reached for his Kelly book. He opened up to the Rhode Island page and pointed at small charter line, which read "12". I thought I made him mad, but he looked me in the eye and said that I did good standing my ground. He shook my hand and said he was looking forward to doing more business with me.

I finished up my tour of the tables with Don C Kelly and his Paper Money Institute. I had my dog eared copy of his book, "National Bank Notes" (6th edition) with me. When I headed for the show, I did not really expect him to be there, but there he was, sitting with his family and talking money. I like to think that I am usually calm, cool, and collected, but the moment caught up with me and I geeked out. I intro-

duced myself, and he said he knew who I was. (We have been corresponding for years). I told him that I have been living out of his book since I purchased it in 2011, and asked him for an autograph. Mr. Kelly said he was not feeling real important that day, so he was only going to sign it "Don Kelly", as the "C" would be presumptuous on his part. He then winked and said that he was not going to charge me for the signing. He misspelled my name, but I certainly was not going to correct him. I have proof that I met the legend. That's a good day.

I spent the rest of my time wandering the Display Room. They hold a yearly competition for individual collections, and there was a large and varied array of United States and foreign currency to behold. I saw several Serial Number 1 notes. The collection that caught my eye was titled "A

to Z -An Assemblage of 1929 Series Notes". The collector put together 26 notes in alphabetical order of cities and towns across the country in high grade condition and with low serial numbers. It was quite impressive.

Overall I had an informative and fun day hanging out with people who have the same interests and speak the same language on what I feel is a compelling topic. I came away with lots of knowledge and a few cherished prizes. And I know I will be back there next June for more of the same. As always, find something you like and collect the heck out of it.
