# Why We Collect

A recent addition to my counterfeit collection is a goloid metric dollar. I have never come across one before. The real examples are patterns that were produced by the U.S. mint in 1878 & 1879. They were experimenting with crown size coins that had 1 gram of gold, 16.1 grams of silver, & 1.9 grams of copper that could be used around the world in international trade. Other governments were also considering similar coins. It never worked out. The Mint was also experimenting with aluminum as a coin metal and used the modified goloid design, which was made by Chief Mint engraver William Barber, to produce patterns made out of aluminum. The real examples were made in small numbers and are very rare and valuable today.

According to a recent article in Coin World magazine, an aluminum example certified by PCGS-Proof 69, recently sold in a Heritage auction for \$33,600. According to my pattern reference book, J-1563, 1878 Goloid metric dollars, if real, were selling in the \$2,000 to \$5,000 range when my book was produced by Whitman publishing in 2003. Therefore real examples are very valuable and worth counterfeiting to deceive collectors. My example was attracted to a magnet and weighed too much. Be careful out there, when you come across raw, uncertified examples.

While the coins were not significant, they were still in the holders Ron kept them in that had detailed notes on their description and pedigree. Ron Haas also showed a 1787 Michin's Mills Georgia Britannia that was picked up from a New England shop in December 2024. Richard McPheeters showed a nicely toned 1962 Mexican peso. Tim O'Keefe showed a 60- coin set and 6 note collection of Gibraltar numismatic items.

Winter Board Meeting:

The required Winter Board meeting was postponed in January due to the cancellation of our meeting because of the severe cold weather. Per the bylaws, Board vacancies were to be filled. Todd Hourihan and Mark Kephart termed out. The Club also had a vacancy caused by Ron Lawrence's passing. Phill Hughes and John Sayko were not up for re-election. Nominations were

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# What We Collect





**C**oming up with a topic for each quarterly newsletter can sometimes be an issue. I like to talk about different aspects of coin collecting. It can be challenging to come up with an interesting subject to present. But occasionally a theme gets dropped in my lap.

I attended the December 2023 meeting of Muskogee's Indian Capital Coin Club. President Mike McLendon likes to have a holiday dinner to celebrate the end of the year. He also invites folks to bring coins and exonumia to look at and possibly sell.

One of our guests was the daughter of the late John Vaughn. He was an avid collector and a prior president of the club. His daughter had an extensive foreign collection she wanted to show the club and to get an opinion on its worth. However, she also had two items that caught my eye. One was an old wallet stuffed full of old papers, along with a tiny box that was similarly filled. I asked to inspect them, and she readily agreed.

I began carefully unraveling the contents and was pleasantly surprised to find worn paperwork dating to World War II. Each piece of parchment had been folded up, and I was amazed at how much was crammed into these two tiny receptacles. It did not take me long to decide that I wanted these. John's daughter was hoping the club would relieve her of



some of the items she brought in order not to bring them back home. I made a reasonable offer on the papers which she accepted.

World War II forced a lot of changes upon the United States, particularly in numismatics. Utilizing and gathering limited resources was a huge part of the war effort. Many of us have seen the monetary changes that occurred from 1939 to 1945. In 1943, in order to make copper available to the military, the Lincoln cent was made out of steel. The problem was the coins came out looking too similar to dimes and were mistaken in change frequently. This led to a shift in 1944 through 1946. Salvaged cartridge cases were used as the alloy to make pennies. Nickel was needed for many items, so from 1942 to 1945 the Jefferson nickel had 40% of its content changed to silver. The

coins are easily recognizable as they moved the mint mark from the right side of Monticello to over the dome. These were also the first US coins to showcase the "P" mint mark (Philadelphia). Security was also at the forefront of the nation. After the invasion of Pearl Harbor, all currency on the island was altered to have the "HAWAII" overprint on the reverse to guarantee authenticity. Beginning in 1942 if you were caught with paper money that did not have the overprint on the island you could be arrested and the currency confiscated.

Once I arrived back home that evening I began to unpack the items I had purchased. The majority were World War II Ration Books. Those that were readable had names of Oklahoma residents from that time period from various cities around the state. The cache had a series of four different books (1-4). A few

still had used and unused stamps within. The stamps were utilized for purchasing gas and sugar. I also came across some blue and red Office of Price Administration (OPA) tokens. These could also be used to buy restricted items. OPA regulated items for rationing and tried to prevent price gouging.

I then came across a folded type-written note that gave some clarity to the objects in the assemblage. The information seems valid but I cannot attribute it to

any particular source, and there was no indication of what year it was prepared. It reads as follows:

“Ration Tokens: Ration tokens were issued by the Office of Price Administration (OPA) as part of the rationing programs that took place during World War II. The use of ration tokens began in February 1944 as they replaced paper coupons. They were released through retail outlets as change for ration stamps. Two types of ration stamps were used made out of red and blue fiber.

The red fiber tokens were for meats and related products: one and three-quarter billion (1,750,000,000) of them were made. Their use was discontinued in 1945. The blue fiber tokens were used for processed foods. Their use was discontinued in October 1944 and a billion of them were struck. The tokens are 16mm in size and read "OPA Red Point" or "OPA Blue Point." All the tokens have two small code letters; their meaning was classified by the government and I do not know if their meanings have ever been released. There are 30 different combinations on the red tokens and twenty-four on the blue. The major rarity is the red

MV. The present value of the red MV is \$100. Unopened boxes of 250 tokens can be found and their value is approximately \$20. "

Around the same time I came across this find, I was introduced to another treasure. I was at a local estate sale in Tulsa that and found a short snorter. These items were a way of promoting camaraderie with flight crews or military units. Each member of the group would produce a piece of currency (usually a low denomination). The bills would be passed around and each member would sign them. The group was required to keep their individual note on them. After a suc-



cessful mission or sortie, the group would gather and celebrate by going to a related social function where adult libations were served. Each member was encouraged to produce their individual note prior to the first round being served. If someone did not have their note, they were required to pay for the first “snort”, hence the name.

The note I found had several signatures on it. This one was a 1943 one gulden of the Netherlands East Indies, which is now present-day Indonesia. Queen Wilhelmina is featured on the bill. I was able to decipher two of the names. One was Hugh Vestal, a Naval officer from Tulsa. The other was Nathan Karfeld, who was with the US Army and out of New York. I am still researching the rest of the names. The more names that can be identified the

more valuable these notes become, especially if they can be attributed to a particular unit.

When all was said and done I had about 15 pages worth of 1940s material. I hate to think where all of this would have ended up if I had not saved it. This was literally history in my hands, and it’s a part of a narrative that is disappearing. All of this was a peek into the past and it was good to see that Oklahomans were doing their part to assist with World War II. You never know what will turn up at a club meeting, which is why I always encourage folks to attend one. None of our Oklahoma clubs charge to attend and the knowledge picked up is invaluable. And always keep your eye out for local history. It might inspire you to find something you like and collect the heck out of it.
